

WEB TV TIPS

Are you considering a WebTV purchase? Recent price cuts have knocked down the current price of the WebTV Plus unit to about \$200, making it a more viable option for most homeowners.

First, be aware that a new version of WebTV should arrive sometime this year. The rumor is that EchoStar Communications and WebTV Networks are negotiating a deal to create a new set-top box that will use satellite communications and add new VCR-like features to WebTV. At this point, no other details are known, but look for an announcement from both of these companies in the next few weeks. In the meantime, the WebTV Plus product is an affordable and available option.

How large is your television screen? If you're still watching TV over a 19-inch or smaller set, you may want to upgrade your TV before you buy WebTV. The real benefit of these set-top boxes is that more than one person can view the Web at the same time, and you won't really see this benefit on a small TV screen. If you can afford it, go for a 27- or 30-inch TV. You'll enjoy WebTV much more.

In some stores, you'll still find the older WebTV product on shelves next to the new WebTV Plus model. The original WebTV unit sells for about \$100, while the newer version sells for about \$200. Is the original WebTV a bargain? Not really. The differences between the two models are many. WebTV Plus offers a faster processor, more RAM, a faster modem, picture-in-picture (WebTV and regular TV windows) capability, a cache for faster performance, and much more. The introduction of WebTV Plus has basically rendered the older version obsolete, so don't waste money on it.

Examine your home's phone line jacks before you buy WebTV. Most people need to do some preparation before they can install the WebTV unit (which rests on top of your TV), because the TV doesn't reside anywhere near a phone line jack. You might want to reorganize your living room furniture so your TV sits near a jack. Or you can invest a few cents in a phone jack splitter, a small plastic device that lets you run two phone cables (one for your phone and one for WebTV) from one phone jack. The WebTV box includes one long phone cable, but not a phone jack splitter.

All versions of WebTV Plus come with a handheld remote control, but you'll find that some versions also offer a wireless keyboard. To really enjoy WebTV, you need the wireless keyboard. Without it, you'll be stuck hunting and pecking characters from an onscreen keyboard with the handheld remote--a very time-consuming and frustrating process. For faster e-mailing and quick access to specific Web sites you need to enter by hand, use the keyboard. The keyboard adds about \$50 or \$60 to your WebTV purchase, but it's well worth the money.

Do you have the Call Waiting feature on your home phone line? If you do, great. If not, you may want to get it before installing WebTV, because when you are surfing you'll tie up the phone line. If you have Call (Continued on page 6 - WEB TV TIPS)

Waiting, WebTV alerts you when you receive an incoming call so you can answer the phone, then press the Reconnect button to continue your WebTV session when the call is complete. Without Call Waiting, your callers just get a busy signal or get routed to your Message Center phone service.

Perhaps the biggest drawback of WebTV's design is that you can't save any data except a list of your favorite Web sites. The Plus model does have a printer port on the back so users can print out browsed pages--but be warned: the printer port is not compatible with all printers. You may buy WebTV thinking you can plug in your printer, only to find out WebTV doesn't support that printer brand or model. Here's the list of supported printers: Hewlett-Packard 400 and 600 DeskJet color printers and Canon 80, 200, 600, and 4000 BubbleJet printers.

WebTV does not provide a local access number for its service in every U.S. city. This means you may be making a toll call when you dial in to search the Web with your set-top box. To manage this situation, WebTV lets you access the Web via some third-party ISPs that support its OpenISP compatibility specifications. If you do use a third-party ISP, however, you can't send and receive e-mail over your WebTV device. To check whether WebTV provides a local access number for its service in your area, call 800/469-3288.

#### **<u>TIP: PROMPT ENTRY</u>**

Today we offer another example of DOS and Windows 95 working hand in hand: Suppose you're working in DOS and you need to enter a path and filename into a command, but the path is LONG, LONG, LONG. Instead of working your way through the directory structure in DOS, try this:

- 1. Click START
- 2. Chose Programs + Windows Explorer
- 3. In Explorer, navigate to the file in question

4. Drag the file to the location in the DOS screen where you want to enter the file path and name.

Windows automatically types the file's full path and name for you! Man, where was this feature five years ago!?!

#### DR. WHO?

Have you been experiencing system faults? Before you call a Windows 98 support technician, call Dr. Watson. Dr. Watson is a troubleshooting utility that takes system snapshots of the present state of your system that may be able to help solve a problem.

Select Start, Programs, Accessories, System Tools, System Information. In the System Information window, select Tools, Dr. Watson. Click the Dr. Watson icon that appears in the tray of your Taskbar, select Dr. Watson, and wait as this utility generates a system snapshot, resulting in (you hope) a diagnosis of the problem.

(Tip: To view nine tabs-worth of details captured by the snapshot, select View, Advanced View.) Name and save the log file. You now have a great resource for that support technician you're about to call.

A nice feature of this utility is that it takes a snapshot automatically when a system fault occurs. But Dr. Watson has to be running in order to take a snapshot.

To be sure that Dr. Watson is running all the time, place a shortcut to Windows\Drwatson.exe in your Startup folder (likely in C:\WINDOWS\Start Menu\Programs\StartUp). From now on, this utility will load whenever Windows 98 starts.

#### MAXIMUM WINDOW CTRL

Ever click IE 4.x's Full Screen button in order to make that window just as big as it can be (the menus shrink and the title bar disappears)? Well here's a little secret: This trick is available from inside any Explorer window. Assuming the window is not currently maximized--in other words, you can see all of its edges--hold down the Ctrl key as you click the middle caption button in that window's upper-right corner. And watch it grow.

The tricky part is getting the window back to the size you started with. Of course, one way is to close and reopen the window. The other, less obvious route is to move your mouse pointer down to the bottom of the screen (to make the Taskbar appear), right-click the window's Taskbar item and select Restore. (Note: If you minimize the window first, right-clicking the Taskbar item and selecting Restore will only return the window to the full screen view.)

#### ALL FOR ONE AND ONE FOR ALL FOLDER VIEWING

Do you have a very favorite way of viewing a folder's contents--for example, always as a Web page and always the Large Icon view? Rather than set these options every time you open a new window, set them once and be done with it. Windows 98 will apply your view options globally (unlike Windows 95, where you had to reset these options constantly).

Open any Explorer window and select View, Folder Options. Select the View tab, click the Like Current Folder button, then click Yes to confirm. Every window you open from that point forward will look the way you want it to.

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#### **Adjust Graphics Settings**

You can adjust the graphics settings on your computer to reach optimal performance. To do so, open the Control Panel, then click the System tab, then he Graphics button. Move the slider to different settings and see which one works best for you.



MICROSOFT posted a package of Year 2000 compliance tools to its Web site Thursday, one of which Windows users can employ to scan their systems for Y2K bugs. The Product Analyzer can be downloaded free from Microsoft's Web site and will ship on the Y2K Resource CD, a quarterly update that Microsoft plans to issue free to subscribers. Microsoft has taken some heat for not fully addressing Y2K concerns related to its vast product line. A few weeks ago, the company issued Y2K updates to Windows 98, which was released just last summer.

When checking your code, keep these dates in mind:

December 31, 2000: The year 2000 is a leap year, so remember, this date will be the 366th day of the year;

1/1/2001: First day in the 21st Century. This is the last leap year related date. You'll want to test your system to make sure the first day of January 2001 can

1/1/2002: Or any other date past this day, to ensure no processing errors occur in backward calculations and processing of dates in the 1980s and 1990s at this point in time;

#### FEMA TAKES Y2K SERIOUSLY

When FEMA gets involved, it could be serious! In a recent press release, Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) officials urged the emergency management, fire, and emergency services communities and the public to get ready now for Y2K. "It is very important that counties, municipalities, school districts, and other organizations that have not yet begun to work on Y2K issues, start now," FEMA Deputy Director Mike Walker said. "While some failures will be minor annoyances, some may have more serious consequences."

In a recent FEMA survey of state emergency management directors concerning Y2K issues at the state and local levels, the directors reported that although Y2K fixes are well underway in state-level emergency preparedness offices, the emergency service systems of many counties and municipalities remain untested. #### **BIG FILES COME IN LITTLE BRIEFCASES**

Do you frequently move files from one system to another--for example from your office PC to a home PC--to work on them? If you simply copy the files to a floppy disk and go about your business, you aren't taking advantage of a very useful Windows 95 feature. The Windows 95 Briefcase will keep multiple copies of the same files current, so you don't have to spend valuable time trying to figure out which is the most recent version. In this series of tips, we show you how to create, use, and update a briefcase on either a desktop or laptop system.

To create a briefcase, right-click on your desktop and select New, Briefcase. (If you don't see Briefcase in the menu, you'll need to install this component: Click Start, Settings, Control Panel. Then select Add/Remove Programs, click the Windows Setup tab, double-click Accessories, select Briefcase, click OK twice, and insert your installation disk when asked.) Select the New Briefcase, press F2 (for Rename), type your name of choice, and press Enter.

Now just copy any files you plan to work on at another location inton the new briefcase, just as you would any other folder: Click and drag the file(s) directly over the briefcase and let go. The files in the briefcase, called sync files, are now linked to the originals. In the next tip, we'll show you how to work on these files at another location without losing your links to the originals.Now we look at moving the briefcase to another location.

A briefcase can travel via floppy disk or laptop. Assuming you want to carry the briefcase to another location on a floppy disk, just move the briefcase to the disk: Right-click the closed briefcase icon, select Send To, then choose your floppy drive in the resulting list. Done.

Planning to do your work on a laptop? Assuming you have a laptop that's connected--via an office network or direct cable connection--to the system on which you created the briefcase, just move the briefcase directly to the laptop, and you're off. (As an alternative, fill the briefcase right on the laptop: Drag-anddrop files from shared folders on the main computer to a My Briefcase icon on the laptop's desktop.)

Now we'll show you how to edit the files in your briefcase.To edit briefcase files on a floppy disk, pop the disk in the floppy drive of the destination computer and copy the briefcase files to anym location on that system's hard drive. (Whatever you do, just don't move the Briefcase off the floppy disk.) Now just go ahead and edit these sync (or linked) copies of the briefcase files.

If you've moved your briefcase from the originating PC to a laptop, leave the files in the briefcase and edit to your heart's content. (Don't copy or move the briefcase files to a new location on the laptop or you'll lose your links to the originals.) Next, we'll show you how to use Briefcase to update the original files.

If you copied your briefcase to a floppy and thencopied the briefcase files to another system, updating is a two-step process.

Here's the first step: At the location where you edited the files, place the floppy disk containing the briefcase in the floppy drive, display its contents, right-click the briefcase icon and select Update All. (Note: If you want to change an operation in the Update dialog box, right-click it and select a new operation, such as Skip.) Click,Update.

Now for the second step: Insert the floppy disk in the drive of the originating PC and follow the steps above (right-click the briefcase icon, select Update All, and so on). The original files are now identical to their copies on the second system (where you edited them).

If you moved your briefcase to a laptop, updating is (Continued on page 12 - Briefcase)

#### **OFFICE UPDATE ALERT!**

This just in from Microsoft Support: Lots of folks have reported they're unable to edit text in an existing Publisher 97 publication AFTER INSTALLING OF-FICE UPDATE.

If you're having this problem, a subscriber identifying himself only as Dan K. lets us know that you can fix things by making a small adjustment to your Intelli-Point mouse settings. Click the Start button, choose Settings, and then choose Control Panel; in the Control Panel window, double-click the Mouse icon. Click the Wheel tab. Under Universal Scrolling, click Exceptions, then Add; click Browse, find your Pubprogram (usually C:\Program lisher file Files\Microsoft Publisher\MSPUB.EXE), and click Open to add Publisher to the list of programs not using Universal Scrolling. Then click OK--and edit away.

#### **OPTICAL STORAGE UPDATE**

You may have heard about CD-ROM drives breaking the 32X speed barrier. Kenwood (http:// www.kenwood.com), for example, now sells a 40X CD-ROM based on Zen Research's TrueX Multibeam technology. Basically, Zen increased the CD-ROM drive speed by designing a read head that reads multiple tracks simultaneously (instead of just reading one track at a time, as traditional CD-ROM drives do).

Are faster CD-ROM drives better? Not for the average user. You'll only really notice the improved performance when you copy files from a CD to your hard disk or when you install software from a CD. In general, CD titles are still optimized for 2X and 4X speed playback so that they run on older PCs as well as the very latest models. When did you last check your CD-ROM settings under Windows? It's a good idea to take a quick look to see that you're getting all the performance you can from your CD-ROM drive.

To investigate your CD-ROM settings, choose Start, Settings, Control Panel from the Start menu. Then select the System object. Click the Performance tab on the System Properties sheet. Choose the File System button within the Advanced Settings box. Finally, select the CD-ROM tab on the File System Properties sheet.

There, you'll find two important settings: Supplemental Cache Size and Access Pattern. Unless your PC is very old, you probably have a 4X or faster CDROM. In this case, you want both settings set to their maximum: Supplemental Cache (Large) and Access Pattern (Quad-Speed or higher). Read your system's documentation if you're unsure about the speed of your CD-ROM drive and the appropriate settings for a slower drive.

Recordable CD drives are becoming more and more popular, and fortunately they are dropping in price every few months. If you plan to ride this wave, you should definitely consider a CD-RW drive rather than a CD-R drive. Why? CD-RW drives are more flexible and more useful in the long run. All CD-RW drives can record CD-R discs as well as CD-RW media, meaning that you can use the CD-R write-once discs or CD-RW rewritable discs in the drive. You can now purchase a CD-RW drive for as little as \$300.
