

## MINIMUM SYSTEM REQUIREMENTS

A lot of hardware upgraders remain confused by the minimum system requirements listed on their product boxes. Upgraders often wonder what the requirements really mean and how their own PCs match up. These product requirements become important when you're considering adding a new videoconferencing kit, CD-recording drive, or some other product to your existing system. Over the next few days I'll pass along some important info about minimum system requirements.

First, be warned. There is no standard for assigning minimum system requirements to any computer product; it's completely up to the manufacturer. Unfortunately, product makers often fudge the numbers so their products appear to be capable of running on a greater variety of PCs than is really possible. You might find your product runs intolerably slow if your system matches just the MINIMUM system requirements listed on the box.

Your best bet is to look for and follow the RECOMMENDED system requirements; ask a salesperson if you don't find them listed on the outside of the product box. When listing recommended system requirements, product makers usually provide the true facts--they want to make sure you know how their product would perform on a properly equipped PC.

When you're looking at the panel of a computer product box, the label may make misleading claims about which operating systems the new product can run on. Don't assume that when a product box states "Windows NT" in big letters, it will run on all Windows NT systems. The numbers and names of Mi-

crosoft's Windows operating systems make sense to no one. Windows 95 had three separate releases: A, B, and C. Windows 98 had two: Windows 98 original and Windows 98 SE (Second Edition). Finally, Windows NT had six service pack releases (read "bug fixes"), called SP1 through SP6.

Look carefully for details about the operating system your new products require. The minimum system requirement list (perhaps in small print) should include the operating system version.

Never confuse a product's minimum system requirements list with its performance specifications. Sometimes upgraders believe they can improve a new product's performance by tweaking one item from the minimum system requirements list--say, by adding more RAM than the requirements call for. This approach to better performance may not work. Keep in mind that overall system performance changes (such as adding RAM) apply to your whole PC, not to a particular device on your system. To improve the performance of a particular component, read its documentation or contact the manufacturer for performance improvement tips. You may find out that some unexpected modifications (perhaps more free disk space or an OS setting) will make the product perform better.

When you inventory your PC to see if it meets a new product's minimum system requirements, make sure you also check the product manufacturer's list of compatible or certified hardware, if one exists. You can usually find this list on the company's Web site. Think of a compatible hardware list as an extension of the minimum system requirements list.

## FREE PC TIPS

We've all heard about the elusive "free" PC. The truth is that many of the original companies offering no-cost systems have since gone out of business. However, several companies still offer ALMOST free PCs, and these offers might catch your attention the next time you go shopping for a new PC. Over the next few days, I'll pass along some tips to help you decide whether a PC deal is a good one.

First, perhaps the most important section of the contract you sign for a "free" PC concerns your ISP. Most of these deals require that you sign up for a multiyear service agreement with a particular ISP. If you compare the monthly service charge against those of other ISP companies, you'll likely find your deal isn't a very good one. Of course, you must balance the price of the contract with the fact that the "free" PC offer includes some hardware a standard ISP doesn't give you.

Always check for hidden cost in a "free" PC offer in addition to researching the full cost of any required ISP contract (we covered this in the last tip). The types of hidden costs you could find include exorbitant shipping costs for sending you the hardware, the fee for including a monitor, and a startup fee for initiating the ISP service. Look around for a deal that doesn't include any of these costs. You should really only pay some nominal fee for hardware (it's supposedly free, anyway), plus your monthly ISP bill.

What kind of horsepower are you getting with your "free" PC deal? Typically, these cheap PCs come configured with midrange components for the processor and modem, and midsize RAM and hard drive. Depending on what purpose you have for the PC, these slower-performing components might work just fine. However, if you plan on crunching spreadsheets, querying databases, or running high-end graphics, your new system's performance might disappoint you.

You should definitely decide whether the PC's performance matches your needs before you sign up for the deal. Many of these offers restrict you in how you can upgrade or expand your system once it arrives. If you can't find a cheap PC with the right performance for

your needs, you're probably better off purchasing a standard PC from a known vendor.

Do you typically rely on technical support when you use a computer? If so, beware the "free" PC offer. Often, technical support is the lowest priority for companies that offer super-discounted systems. In fact, some owners of the original "free" PC offers now find themselves without any technical support because the company they signed up with has gone out of business. You might also encounter a fee for technical support. Once again, try to avoid deals with such hidden costs.

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### DUMP THE CACHE

Here's a great trick from TipWorld subscriber Ronald Gordon, a handy guy to have around if you need to save space:

"This tip will help people like myself who use an old computer with a very small hard drive. Mine is a 486 DX2 with a 575MB hard drive.

"To remove your cache files from Internet Explorer 5, select Tools, Internet Options. Then click the Delete Files button. (IE 4 users should click View, Internet Options.) This does not remove all your cache files; a series of folders contain downloaded files hidden in the Temporary Internet Files folder. These may hold many megabytes of files and don't get deleted when you clean your IE 5 cache files.

"To clean up these files, try this: Open Windows Explorer. Then navigate to the Temporary Internet Files folder, probably in the folder C:\Windows\Temporary Internet Files (C is the drive where you should have IE 5 installed).

"Open the Temporary Internet Files folder and look for folders within it that have odd names like 9jkLv13og or D2337xxm. Select and open the first folder. Press Ctrl-A or click and drag to select all the files.

"Deselect any file named desktop.ini, as this is a system file, and delete the rest (Shift-Delete to bypass the waste basket.) Press the Delete key on your keyboard. Repeat this procedure for each folder." Thanks, Ronald!

# Windows 95 Tips

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## RECYCLE BIN WARNS YOU WHEN IT'S FULL

Do you feel as though you never get around to emptying your Recycle Bin? Fortunately, Windows 95 has a built-in reminder. If the total size of files in the Recycle Bin exceeds a set limit (by default, 10 percent of your hard drive's total storage space), a message pops up letting you know you should take out the trash.

If you're low on disk space and have a hard time remembering to take out the trash, you may want to adjust this percentage to a smaller number, so that Windows 95 reminds you to empty the Recycle Bin sooner.

Right-click the Recycle Bin icon on your desktop, and then select Properties. In the resulting dialog box, adjust the lever to the desired percentage, such as 1 percent, and click OK.

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## DOS and Screen Savers

Some DOS programs won't run if you have a Windows 95 Screen Saver. How can you tell? Try this when that DOS program just won't run no matter what else you try:

1. In Explorer, right-click the DOS program's icon.
2. Choose Properties and then click the Misc tab.
3. In the dialog box, click the Allow screen saver option.

Close the dialog box.

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## MOUSE POINTER INDICATES MOVE OR COPY

Can't seem to remember whether holding down Shift (or Ctrl) while you drag and drop an icon moves or copies that item? Keep your eye on the mouse pointer. If you see a little white box with a plus sign (+) attached to your mouse pointer, you're about to copy the item(s) you're dragging. If you see no symbol attached, you're about to move the item(s). (If

you see a shortcut arrow, as in the case of dragging an icon down to the Start button, you're about to create a shortcut.)

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## CREATE EMERGENCY RECOVERY DISK

To keep yourself safe from disaster, create an Emergency Recovery disk. Once you do, you'll have a complete inventory of your system and configuration files, as well as the Emergency Recovery Utility (the program that restores these files to your system) close at hand.

Insert your Windows 95 installation CD in your CD-ROM drive, select Browse This CD, and navigate your way to the OTHER\MISC\ERU folder. Inside, double-click ERU.EXE, then follow along as Windows 95 walks you through the disk creation process. (You can save the recovery files on a disk or a drive, such as on a network.) You'll even see a preview of the files that will be copied. When all the files have been copied to the destination, you'll see a message telling you the operation was a success, along with instructions on how to use the disk in the event of a disaster.

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## DriveSpace is Picky

If you installed any DriveSpace drives, don't use any other company's programs for checking your hard Drive files. Only ScanDisk is sure to be fully compatible with DriveSpace drives. And don't run any other programs while ScanDisk is running.

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## SHORTCUT FOR RESTARTING WINDOWS

Looking for a quick way to restart Windows 95 without a time-consuming "cold" or "warm" reboot? Select Start, Shut Down (or place the focus on the desktop and press Alt-F4). In the resulting dialog box, select Restart The Computer, then hold down the Shift key while clicking the Yes button. Windows 95 restarts without shutting down and rebooting the entire system.

# WINDOWS 98 TIPS

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## EXPLORER WINDOWS HAVE TOOLBARS, TOO

The next time you're going about your business in an Explorer window--single or double-paned--take notice of the often-overlooked Toolbar. (If you don't see it, select View, Toolbars, Standard Buttons.) It has buttons for a lot of the commands you might otherwise use your right-mouse button for. Funny thing, too, because a button only takes one click.

See the button with the blue curved arrow? That's Undo. The "X" button mimics Delete. Clicking the hand holding the paper is the same as choosing Properties. On the right, you'll find your View options--Large Icons, Small Icons, List, or Details. Hold the cursor over any button on the Toolbar, and you'll see a box telling you what it does.

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## REARRANGE PAINT TOOLS AND COLORS

Not happy with the placement of Paint's tools and colors? Then move them. You can turn them into floating palettes, for placement anywhere on screen, or stick them to the edge of the Paint window.

Open Paint by selecting Start, Programs, Accessories, Paint. Click a blank area around the edge of the tools or colors, and a black box will appear to let you know they're selected. Now just drag the palette where you want it, along its existing edge or anywhere on screen.

Don't like floating palettes? Just like the Taskbar, they'll snap into place at the edge of the Paint window. Tools stick to the side edges; colors stick to the top or bottom.

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## NOTEPAD LOG FILES

Notepad is a small, can't-even-really-call-it-a-word-processor program that comes with Windows 98. It isn't fancy, but it does have one unique feature: log files.

Type .LOG at the top of a Notepad file, and it

becomes a log file, just like a journal. From then on, every time you make an entry in the file, Notepad adds a time and date stamp. You'll see the stamp the next time you open the file.

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## EDIT BACKGROUND PATTERNS

Want to make your own background pattern for your desktop? Click the desktop with the right mouse button, choose Properties, and take a look at the Patterns list on the Background tab. Pick one that looks like it might be fun to change, such as Scottie, and click the Edit Pattern button. Two things first, though: Make sure (None) is selected for Wallpaper, and if your desktop has a black background, you'll need to switch it to another color by clicking the Display Properties' Appearance tab and changing it in the Color dropdown menu.

The pattern is nothing more than a grid of black or colored boxes. Click a box, and it toggles between black and your desktop's background color. The nice thing is that you get to see your changes right in the Sample box as you work. When you're done, give the pattern a new name (unless you want to overwrite the old one), click Add, then click Done.

Is your favorite dog a Doberman instead of a Scottie? Make the tail and legs longer, and you've got a whole new look!

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## INCREASE SCROLLBAR SIZE

Do you find the scrollbars in your applications and dialog boxes too small to grab onto? Windows 98 lets you make them as big (or as small) as you want.

Right-click the desktop, select Properties, and click the Appearance tab. Under Item, select Scrollbar, adjust the Size using the up arrow, and watch your change in the preview. When you like what you see, click OK to keep the change.

## REPAIR INTERNET EXPLORER 5

If Internet Explorer 5 starts to behave badly, try the Repair option. Note: In some cases, folks who have Windows 98 Second Edition can't find the Repair feature for IE 5.

First try this. Choose Start, Settings, Control Panel. Choose Add/Remove Programs. Select Microsoft Internet Explorer 5 and Internet Tools (the name of your IE 5 may vary slightly, but it should be pretty obvious). Select the radio button marked Repair Internet Explorer. Then click the OK button. Choose Yes when the confirmation box appears.

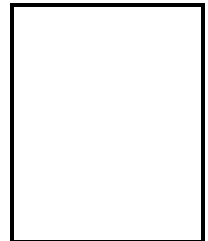
