"A couple of days ago I got an e-mail from hahaha @sexyfun.net containing the Snow White virus. Since this is the second time it has been sent to me from the same source, what can I do to notify the proper authorities? Or is there nothing I can do but delete the e-mail?"

Unfortunately, there are no proper authorities. Although the U.S. Federal Bureau of Investigation may be looking at Internet crime more closely in the future, these worms spread automatically, from one victim's infected computer to the next. Expecting someone else to control that is like expecting someone to stop a monsoon.

In the case of the Hybris worm, there is no "same source." The Hybris worm forges that e-mail address and sends itself by harvesting e-mail addresses from people who click on that file. Someone with whom you have corresponded is to blame, and you may be able to figure out who it is from the e-mail header and let them know they have a problem. Had you clicked on that file, others would soon be receiving a copy of Hybris--from YOUR computer.

# Windows 95 Tips

#### RUN COMMAND LINE TO OPEN APPLICATION

Hey, MS-DOS lovers, do you wish you could replace all that double-clicking with some good old fashioned typing? Remember the Run command line? Whether it's a program, folder, or Web page you're after, you can type your way there.

Need to open an application? For some, a desktop icon or Start menu item is the fastest way to launch. But if your application isn't handy, try this: Select Start, Run (or press Ctrl-Esc, R), and the Run dialog box appears. Type the name of the program you want to open, such as

#### Notepad

press Enter, and up pops the program window.

(Note: If Windows 95 doesn't recognize the program you want to open, you'll need to type the full path of that program's executable file. But that isn't as bad as it sounds. Once you've typed an application's path, you can select it from the Run dialog box's pop-up list. Tip-in-a-tip: Use the up or down cursor arrows to scroll through this list.)

You can use this technique to open any folder window. For example, to open the Windows folder, select Start, Run (or press Ctrl-Esc, R), type

#### windows

and press Enter. As with programs, if Windows 95 doesn't recognize the folder name--typically folders that aren't in the Windows folder or on the root of your hard drive--you'll need to type its full path, for instance

#### X:\WINDOWS

where X is the drive letter.

Want to jump directly to a Web site? Similar to the Address line of your browser window, the Run command line can take you there. Select Start, Run (or press Ctrl-Esc, R), type the URL of the site you want to access, then press Enter. Presto--your Web browser springs to life (if it isn't already open) and takes you directly to that site.

#### HIDDEN FILE ATTRIBUTE

Do you have some top-secret files you'd like to keep out of sight? Mark them hidden, and they'll magically disappear, along with the rest of your system's hidden files. (That is, assuming you keep your hidden files hidden.)

Right-click a file you'd like to hide and select Properties. On the General tab of the resulting Properties dialog box, select Hidden, then click OK. Now be sure that your hidden files are actually hidden: In any Explorer window, select View, Options, click the View tab, select Hide Files Of These Types, and click OK. (If you have the IE 4.0 Desktop Update installed, select View, Folder Options, click the View tab, select Do Not Show Hidden Files, and click OK.) Now, any files marked hidden will disappear from Explorer windows, your desktop, and so on.

If and when you need to access a hidden file, you have two choices. One, opt to display hidden files using the options described above. Or two, type the file's exact name (and navigate your way to its exact location) in the Open dialog box of its native application.

(Note: Marking a file hidden isn't a true security measure since anyone who knows the name and location of a file can open it. It's really just a deterrent--out of sight, out of mind.)

# WINDOWS 98 TIPS

#### CHANGING A COMPUTER'S OWNER INFORMATION

Don't you hate the fact that your used computer identifies someone else as the registered owner? Whenever you install new programs, you're always prompted with the previous owner's name. It's frustrating. Well, as long as you're comfortable editing the Registry, you can easily change the ownership information. (Note: As always, we recommend that you first back up your Registry files--User.dat and System.dat, hidden files on the root of your hard drive.)

To change the owner information, first go to Start, Run and type

#### regedit

Press Enter to open the Registry Editor. Navigate to

HKEY\_LOCAL\_MACHINE\SOFTWARE\Microsof t\Windows\CurrentVersion

In the right pane of the CurrentVersion key, you'll see values named RegisteredOrganization and RegisterdOwner. Just double-click these, enter the new information, and click OK. Close RegEdit and you're done.

#### RENAMING A FILE OR FOLDER WITH A KEYSTROKE

There are several ways to rename files and folders when browsing your computer, but the fastest may be just to select the file or folder and press F2. The cursor moves to the naming window without your having to fiddle around with more mouse clicking.

#### RIGHT-CLICKING FROM THE KEYBOARD

Here's a handy keyboard trick that's good for opening contextual menus without using the mouse. Just have your file or folder highlighted on screen, then press Shift-F10 to simulate a right-click from the keyboard. From there, you can use the arrow keys and the Enter key to select something from the popup menu.

#### SWITCHING BETWEEN LANGUAGES ON THE KEYBOARD

Recently, a reader wrote in to ask how he could switch quickly from using standard English lettering to using the Greek alphabet. From the Keyboard control panel, you can designate a keyboard shortcut for switching between languages. First, go to Start, Settings, Control Panel and then double-click the Keyboard icon. Click the Language tab and choose either Left-Alt-Shift or Ctrl-Shift to choose a keyboard shortcut for switching languages. When you're finished, click OK. Incidentally, as long as the Enable Indicator On Taskbar icon is checked on the Language tab of the Keyboard control panel, you can also switch languages by clicking on the language indicator in your System Tray.

#### **CHANGING FILE DESCRIPTIONS**

When you view a folder in Details view in Windows 98 (which you can do at any time by going to View, Details while in a folder), one of the columns is called File Type. If you like, you can edit these file type descriptions, perhaps to give yourself more information when looking through folders. Just open a folder, go to View, Folder Options, and click the File Types tab. Select any registered file type from the window on the left and then click the Edit button. In the Description Of Type box, you can enter your own text. When finished, click OK twice to exit.

#### OPENING MY COMPUTER IN DUAL-PANE MODE

If you want to browse your computer in dual-pane mode (the typical view for Windows Explorer), you can do this quickly. Just hold down the Shift key while double-clicking the My Computer icon.



#### VARY RECYCLE BIN OPTIONS FROM ONE DRIVE TO THE NEXT

If you find that you never use the Recycle Bin, you may want to turn it off altogether. Right-click the Recycle Bin icon on your desktop and select Properties. On the Global tab, with Use One Setting For All Drives selected, click the check box next to Do Not Move Files To The Recycle Bin. Remove Files Immediately When Deleted. Click OK.

The nice thing is, you still have one safety net: Whenever you attempt to delete an item, you'll be asked to confirm the operation.

#### VARY RECYCLE BIN OPTIONS FROM ONE DRIVE TO THE NEXT

Unlike previous versions of Windows, this edition allows you to vary your Recycle Bin options from one drive to the next.

So for example, if you have all your data files stored on one drive, and need to be absolutely sure that nothing is deleted from this drive in error, you might leave the Recycle Bin active for that drive only. Or, depending on the capacity of each drive, you may choose to vary the maximum size (as a percentage of the drive) at which Windows Me will prompt you to empty that Recycle Bin.

Regardless of your needs, to set different options for different drives, open the Recycle Bin Properties dialog box (right-click the Recycle Bin icon on your desktop and select Properties), and on the Global tab, select Configure Drives Independently. One at a time, click the tab that represents each of your drives and set the options accordingly.

#### USER PROFILES KEEP EVERYBODY HAPPY

Does more than one person use your computer--for example, a home system? Can't seem to agree on your

desktop settings? User profiles enable different users to use different settings--wallpaper, desktop shortcuts, Favorites list, Start menu and so on. With user profiles enabled, everyone logs on to the system using a user name and password to access his or her personal settings.

To enable user profiles, select Start, Settings, Control Panel, then double-click Users. Now just follow along to complete the Enable Multi-user Settings wizard. You'll need to select a user name, a password, and the items you want to customize. Click Finish, wait for Windows Me to set up the new profile, and then click Yes to restart Windows (or No to restart later). To set up the next user, double-click Users, click the New User button, and so on.

From now on, whenever you start Windows Me, you'll get a Welcome to Windows dialog box. Type your user name and password, and then click OK. Now go ahead and start customizing. Your changes won't affect anyone else's settings.
