

FTC HAS A BEEF WITH SPAM

SAN FRANCISCO--If you think you get a lot of junk e-mail, it's still nothing compared with the FTC's in-box.

The Federal Trade Commission acts as a catcher's mitt to about 17,000 pieces of unsolicited commercial e-mail per day, or 540,000 pieces a month, which are filed away into its spam-designated database. This mailbox, an unadvertised service set up by the FTC in 1998, is for consumers and Internet service providers to forward unwanted commercial e-mail.

"If (anti-spam) legislation passes this year, then we expect to receive up to half a billion pieces a month," Jennifer Mandigo, a staff attorney at the FTC in charge of enforcing any potential anti-spam laws, said at the SpamCon conference here. The massive database of e-mail lets the FTC search for spam trends or potential targets.

If consumers had federal recourse against spammers, they might be more likely to file a complaint or forward mail to the federal agency, but the likelihood of a law passing this year appears slim. One of the most visible bills before Congress this year, H.R. 718--introduced by Rep. Heather Wilson, R-N.M.--is "on the fast track to be killed," Mandigo said.

Nevertheless, the FTC is gearing up to enforce any laws Congress may pass this year, despite its support of industry self-regulation over federal laws.

"We would rather the industry take a crack at it first," Mandigo said.

Despite the absence of a federal law, the FTC has been acting the part of Big Brother for consumers hit with fraud via spam. "We're doing something. We're not just one of these bloated organizations," Mandigo said.

Thirty of the 182 Internet-related cases of fraud the FTC has filed involve spam. For example, the FTC successfully fought a spammer who advertised a pyramid scheme via e-mail, in *FTC v. Martinelli* in July 1999. The decision required that the defendants pay \$72,000, which was returned to the fraud victims.

As with Net fraud, the FTC is concerned about spam because it's the easiest and most widespread means for disseminating fraudulent claims. It's also clogging in-boxes, costing time and money for consumers and Internet service providers.

For these reasons the agency is big on education, via workshops and the publishing of consumer information about junk e-mail. It also sets up educational Web sites about Internet fraud and spam, which are sometimes disguised as get-rich-quick or lose-weightfast sites for effect.

Apart from these efforts, the FTC has testified at a hearing for a Senate anti-spam bill, S. 630. The agency is generally supportive of this bill and H.R. 718, its companion in the House, Mandigo said. The legislation allows the FTC to treat a violation as a trade-securities violation, for which it can collect up to \$11,000 per occurrence.

"These are the best two bills we've seen--but maybe not the best," she said.

Windows 95 Tips

RegClean (Win 95/98/NT)

If you have Windows 98 (SE), and every once in a while you get some kind of "dll" error message. What's going on? DLL (Dynamic Link Library) errors can be caused by problems in your System Registry, and Microsoft offers a free program called RegClean that may help you out.

When you install, uninstall or reinstall programs, your computer creates, modifies or deletes registry "keys." Over time your Registry may get cluttered with unused and maybe even corrupt data, and that can cause system errors like you're experiencing.

That's where RegClean comes in -- this program scans your Registry for problems and automatically fixes errors. Because your computer's Registry is a vital part of Windows, RegClean errs on the side of caution, and may not fix all of your troubles (it purposely leaves intact any entry that it doesn't understand or that may be correct).

To use RegClean (Win NT/95/98), download a free copy at: http://www.microsoft.com/downloads/re-lease.asp?ReleaseID=18924

Once you've downloaded RegClean, double-click it to start, and it will display a progress dialog box (the RegClean scan can take anywhere from 30 seconds to 30 minutes, so be patient).

Once the scan is complete (and the progress meters have closed), you'll be prompted to quit RegClean (if it didn't find any errors, or if you don't want to fix the problems it found) or use the program to fix the errors.

Assuming you want to use RegClean to fix your errors, it will show a progress meter until it has finished. The program also creates an Undo file if you ever need it (in the folder in which you ran Reg-Clean).

USE TWEAK UI TO OVERRIDE LOGIN DIALOG BOX

Use the following techniques for disabling the login dialog box: Enter a user name and password when Windows starts, if you haven't already. Then change the current password to no password: Open the Control Panel, double-click the Passwords icon, and click the Change Windows Password button. On the Old Password line, enter your current password. Press Tab to jump to the New Password line, and press Enter. You'll see a dialog box telling you that your password has been changed, and the Welcome To Windows 95 dialog box won't bother you again.

Another suggestion of removing the login screen is to use the Microsoft Tweak UI utility. On the Network tab, you can specify a login name and password to enter upon login. Tweak UI then apparently modifies the Registry so that Windows runs a login 'script' upon startup and enters this information automatically. The only disadvantage is that, as Tweak UI warns, 'Note: The automatic logon password is not encrypted. Any user with access to Regedit can view or modify it."

Assuming you have Tweak UI installed (if not, see note below), open the Control Panel and double-click Tweak UI. Click the Network tab and select Log On Automatically At System Startup. Type your user name and password, then click OK.

and download Tweakui.exe. Double-click this file to extract its contents, then right-click Tweakui.inf and select Install. Once Tweak UI is installed, you can access it by double-clicking the new Tweak UI Control Panel item.

WINDOWS 98 - WINDOWS ME TIPS

Frozen Computer Screen

Note: This tip applies to Microsoft Windows 98 and Windows Me.

When nothing onscreen moves except the mouse pointer, the computer is frozen up solid. Try the following approaches, in the following order, to correct the problem:

* Press Esc twice. This often doesn't work, but try it anyway.

* Press Ctrl, Alt, and Delete all at the same time. You'll see an error message that lists the names of currently running programs -- including the one that's not responding. Click the name of the program that's causing the mess and click the End Task button. If that still doesn't work, try clicking the Shut Down button that's next to the End Task button or pressing Ctrl, Alt, and Delete again. That shuts down your computer and lets you start over.

* Push the computer's reset button.

* Turn off the computer, wait 30 seconds, and then turnit on again. Don't ever flip the computer off and on again quickly. Doing so can damage its internal organs.

TURNING OFF WINDOW ANIMATIONS

Windows takes the liberty of animating all sorts of on-screen processes. When you minimize a window, for instance, a very brief animation shows the window getting smaller until it disappears. These animations are meant to provide clues as to what is happening on screen, but you can speed up your computer's operation a tad by getting rid of them. To get rid of window animations, right-click on the desktop and choose Properties. Click Effects and uncheck the box that says Animate Windows, Menus And Lists. Your computer will look a little "off" at first, but once you get used to it, you'll probably enjoy the extra speed.

WAV or MIDI?

This tip applies to Windows 98 and Windows Me.

Windows Media Player can play two different types of sound files: digitized and synthesized. The two types of files sound completely different from each other.

The .WAV sound, referred to as a "wave" sound, is an actual sound that happened when somebody was nearby with a microphone to record it. The microphone grabbed the sound waves from the air and pushed them into the computer's sound card. The computer turned the incomingsound waves into numbers (digitized them), stuck them into a file, and slapped the letters .WAV onto the end of the filename.

To play back the .WAV file, Media Player grabs the numbers from the file and converts them back into sound waves. Then the sound card pushes the sound out of the speaker. The result? You hear the recording, just as if you played it from a cassette tape.

MIDI files (also called a .MID sound), contain sounds that never really happened. A computer with a sound card listened as someone played an electronic instrument, usually a keyboard. As the computer heard each note being played, it wrote down the name of the instrument, the name of each note, its duration, and its timing. Then it packed all that information into a file and added .MID to the end of the filename.

When Media Player plays a .MID file, it looks at these embedded instructions. Then it tells whatever synthesizer is hooked up to the computer to recreate those sounds.

Both bills make it illegal to send commercial e-mail with false headers and subject lines and require the email to let consumers opt out of receiving further communication.

One potential issue with the Senate bill, however, is that it requires a "knowledge standard for deceptive headers," which means that the burden of proof is on the FTC to establish that the sender of an unsolicited e-mail intended to send a deceptive message, she said.

"We all know (spam) injures consumerism but standing in front of a judge as the FTC and quantifying the injury, that's where it gets difficult," Mandigo said.
