Under Attack by Cyber Worms

f you use e-mail, as you most likely do, you may have noticed the recent increased onslaught of worms and viruses. Using a variety of techniques, the latest attacks


are once again flooding our inboxes with dangerous content, as well as seeking out security holes in our systems and attacking us through our internet and network connections.

One insidious family of new pests is the group referred to as the "Bagel" or "Beagle" virus and worm family. Now spreading

endemically, as I type this, are sixteen variants, referred to by the sequential letters "A" through "K". These nasties were explicitly designed to slip through most spam

filters, and many antivirus scans by concealing their malicious payload in a password protected zip (compressed) file, which can only be opened by opening the email, and clicking on the attachment, and entering the password shown. The rapid appearance of the many variants also makes it easier to slip through our antivirus defenses, and more difficult to protect against.

While most of us are reluctant to click on attachments from unknown senders, these creatures try to use "human engineering" to trick us into opening the email and activating the attachment. This is accomplished by



spoofing the "From:" line and making it falsely appear to be from the management, tech support, email server, billing department, or other department of your ISP (Internet Service provider). They use an internal template to create a variety of subjects and messages incorporating the name of the ISP in order to appear to be authentic. Some of the common subject lines are "E-mail account

security warning", "Warning about your e-mail account", "Email account utilization warning", "E-mail account disabling warning", and similar subjects. The body of the message typically starts with some variation of "Dear user of (the name of your ISP)", followed by text indicating that your email account is about to be disabled, you have been

sending out infected emails, the email server will be shut down, and similar attention getters. The punch line may be of the type "For information more the attached see file" "Please. or read the attachment for further details." To make it look even more legitimate and secure (and to bypass spam and virus filtering) it may contain a closing line to the effect of "For security reasons attached file is pass-

word protected" or "The password is (password)."

The infected e-mail is signed with "Sincerely," or "Best wishes," or some nicety, and often has a tagline "The team, http://www.(the name of your ISP)"

Attached to the e-mail is an innocent looking file possibly with the filename (ending in ".zip") "Information", "Readme", "Document", Continue on page 3

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Continued from page one "Message" or some other innocuous name. If this file is opened, and your antivirus software does not detect the payload, the computer will be instantly infected. Once infected, the worm will search your computer for any e-mail addresses, and use its built-in e-mail utility to replicate itself to the e-mail addresses found on your computer, again spoofing the name of the recipients ISP as the sender. If you think about it, this is both a clever way to entice even a suspicious victim into opening the attachment and infecting his computer, and an insidious thing to do to countless thousands of innocent victims. One of the common payloads in the Bagel/Beagle series is a utility that deactivates many of the popular antivirus programs, and prevents them from being updated, leaving the computer open to later attacks. Some versions also open a port through a firewall (ZoneAlarm is often targeted) allowing external "backdoor" access to the computer, and broadcasting the IP address of the vulnerable computer over the Internet. Fortunately, many of the Bagel/Beagle variants have code in them that will cease their propagation between March 14 and 25.

In another trick, some of the new virus and worm writers are trying to fool us into believing that their content is safe by including a falsehood either in its subject or as a closing tagline that the message has been scanned by a major antivirus program (most often Norton AntiVirus). Just because an e-mail is from someone you know, and contains a line indicating that it is certified as safe, do not believe it. The creator of the worm is lying to you by concealing the real sender by spoofing the "From:" line to appear that it is from an acquaintance, and including the "certified virus free" tag.

The massive recent attacks by the authors of the Netsky, MyDoom, and Bagel/Beagle viruses and worms have created a battle among themselves, indicated by messages encoded in their respective payloads. According to several antivirus companies, the code includes attacks on each other, such as when Netsky attacks a computer already infected with MyDoom or Bagel/Beagle, Netsky tries to deactivate them, while installing its own malicious code, and stating "We kill malware writers. They have no chance". The author of Bagel responded in a quickly released variant "Hey Netsky... Don't ruin our business. Wanna start a war?". Later variants of these three malicious products have continued the dispute.

Wouldn't it be nice if these virus authors spent more time and effort fighting each other, and less time trying to infect our computers?

What are Blogs?

Blogs & Your Business

The bottom line is you need to determine how a blog will benefit your business, determine a schedule and adhere to it. Let your readers know what to expect and when to expect it. Blogs provide great supplemental content and direct attention to areas of your business that you want to showcase; you direct the content but let your readers guide you.

Creating a Blog

There are numerous online tools that can be used to create a blog. We found that because of security concerwould just be best to use a standard html program. In our case we used Dreamweaver and create daily posts. It.s really not much more complicated than typing an email. The content is then sent via FTP to a web server. If you want to test the waters there are online web-based tool that helps you publish to the web instantly. The most popular web based tool is likely Blogger http://www.blogger.com.

Other Advantages to Blogs

While you may initially create a blog for your existing customers, you may find that you can attract new customers by illustrating your expertise in a specific field. There are numerous websites that act as .blog search engines., be sure to submit your sites to these websites to increase your exposure. This will also help with your page rank and possibly increase the likelihood you will receive decent ranking with Google. You can also create an RSS feed in order to syndicate blog content and gain additional exposure.

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Save Pictures from the Web: Although some photos on Web pages are copyright protected, in Internet Explorer you can try to save them as files on your own computer. Right-click the picture, select Save Picture As, and specify the location where you want to save the picture.

- * To Better See a Web Page: If you're having a bit of trouble distinguishing some of the words on an oddly formatted Web page in Internet Explorer, select Internet Options from the Tools menu. Use the Colors And Fonts button under the General tab to specify how you want the text to look. Then click the Accessibility button, select the checkboxes that tell IE to ignore site-specific colors and sizes, and click OK.
- * Add Google to IE: If you use IE, you can download a toolbar from Google that will add a search box to your browser's interface. To download the Google toolbar, go to http://www.google.com. Click the Services & Tools link. Scroll down to the Google Tools section and click the Google Toolbar link. Scroll down to the bottom of the page and click the Get The Google Toolbar button. Next, click the Terms Of Use button and then click the Install With Advanced Features button.



Five Things You Didn't Know About Google

Everybody loves Google, the super search engine that, virtually overnight, kicked its cyber competitors to the curb. But lightning-fast text, news, and image searches are far from its only tricks.

1. Get travel updates.

To check delays and weather conditions at U.S. airports, enter the airport's three-letter code, followed by a space and the word, "airport" (e.g., "LAX airport"). The first item on the returned search page links to the FAA's Air Traffic Control System Command Center. Click it for specific LAX conditions.

Another two clicks checks the flight status of any U.S. airline. Enter the airline name and flight number (e.g., "AA 32," for American Airlines flight 32). The first item tracks flight status at Travelocity.

2. Shop N you drop, even on your cellL

Froogle is a new Google service that tracks down products and pricing for instant comparisons. Even better, load it on your PDA or Web-enabled cell phone for on-the-spot in-store price checks. Don't worry about the tiny screen, Froogle converts regular-sized Web pages into something your cell and PDA can display. For PCs and PDA, go to: http://froogle.google.com/. For cell phones, go to: wml.froogle.com.

3. Pick a number, any number.

Google can hunt anything down if you punch in the right numerals. This includes bar codes, vehicle IDs (VINs), patents, airline registrations, telephone area codes, and even tracking numbers for UPS, Fed Ex, and the U.S. Postal Service. Enter the number and, in most cases, Google is smart enough to figure out what you're looking for.

Try UPC code searches for very specific product information, product reviews, and comparison pricing.

4. Throw out your dictionary,

What's the meaning of life? Ask Google! Type "define:" with no space between the colon and the word or phrase you want more information about, and Google will tell you what you need to know. For example, type "define: chicken," and you'll learn that a chicken is "a domestic fowl bred for flesh or eggs; believed to have been developed from the red jungle fowl," among other things. Google aggregates the definitions from numerous online sources.

5. You don't even need to spell

Goggle doesn't care whether you type Massachewsett or Massachusetts. It will guess what you 're really looking for and return relevant results. A polite "Did you mean:" link just beneath you search term suggests alternative spellings.

Security Updates CD

Get Your Fix: Free CD from Microsoft

I have good news for those of you who have not been the first on the block to get your Windows updates. Whether it's that you don't have time to wait for a download every time you boot up, or maybe you have a PC that's not connected to the Internet. Whatever the reason, you have a PC that is not up-to-date.


Since most Microsoft's updates are aimed at security issues, bugs, and general fixes this could be an area of concern. There's no reason to stress however—Microsoft has recently released a CD-ROM with all of their Hot Fixes and updates. Best of all, it's FREE. You don't even pay for shipping and handling. Uncle Bill must have decided that it might be a good idea to release a CD of updates in advance of Service Pack 2 (due the end of 2004).

This CD supports Operating systems from 98 first edition through Windows XP up to Oct 15,2003. That means any updates that Microsoft has put out since this date will be absent from the list. It's important to keep your pc up-to-date. It improves performance, security, and compatibility and without them you're not getting everything you can from your pc.

When you run the disk for the first time it acts just like a regular Windows update. It scans your PC and comes up with what operating system you're using and what updates it needs. The program then presents you with a list of needed updates, you acknowledge the updates in the list you wish to install, then installs them.

So don't worry about putting the kids' PC online just to keep it updated, and no need to leave your PC online for an hour and a half tying up the phone line just to get the latest patch. Just go to the MS web page, fill out the e-form and wait for the snail to bring it to your door.

If you are running a wireless network with the following setup, Desktop with the cable broadband coming in and a laptop. The desktop has a firewall program installed. (It's either Mcafee or Norton) does the laptop need one too? Or does the desktop's firewall protect both systems.

. No they are independent, unless you have a couple of thousand dollars to spend on a enterprise firewall system. Each machine needs its own firewall/antivirus since each machine acts independently. The modem just changes the cable system signal into a machine understandable signal, no checking is done and the wireless router just keeps track of what each machine is sending and receiving from the modem with some rudimentary error handling and collision avoidance software/hardware, collisions happen when both machines try sending or receiving traffic at the same time and they hit the router simultaneously. If you have a hardware firewall it only traps signals from unauthorized/ unsolicited access and it might change your IP address in and out to mask where the signal is actually coming fro/ going to and is not usually configurable as a software fire-One machine does not know what the other is doing, so you need separate firewalls (unless you have a separate computer that acts only as a firewall) between the input signal and the actual execution of commands. Also as with all wireless traffic unless you encrypt/decrypt between machines than anyone can pick up what is being transmitted, newer firewalls and antivirus software take care of this also, at extra cost.
