

### AVerMedia TV Box 9

"Turn your LCD / CRT or Plasma Monitor into a TV/ Multimedia Center with a neat little tower shaped unit, roughly the size of a thin paperback book."



This is a neat little tuner allows you to view television on your computer. It also lets you connect your X Box, Play Station, or Game Cube to TV Box 9, and have fun game playing on the PC. You can also connect a DVD player, camcorder, or VCR. Just like the PC monitor, be it CRT or LCD, TV Box 9 also works well as a tuner with any flat screen TV.

It is easy to setup, no software is required. It either lies flat or stands as a tower in the provided stand. All you do is disconnect the VGA cable out to the monitor from the PC, and then attach the cable to the VGA out jack on TV Box 9. Another provided VGA cable is connected from the VGA in on the TV Box 9 to the PC. Disconnect the speakers from the PC, and connect to the speaker out on TV Box 9. Another supplied cable is then connected from the audio in jack on the unit, to the audio out on the PC.

With a neat silver coloring, the unit has channel up/down buttons and volume buttons. I do like the neat blue tint to the Off/On light.

The remote control is the main workhorse, operating with an on screen display. Of course, just like a regular remote, it takes care of scanning for channels to set, viewing source, and parental lockout codes. I was able to fine-tune the picture quality via the remote.


PIP function is fun with the TV Box 9. Besides the usual PIP that can be moved around the screen, and multiple PIPs, 13 at one time, the PIP can also be translucent allowing me to watch a program and work on the PC at the same time, seeing the project under-

neath the televised image.



Overall picture quality was very nice: resolution of 1280 x 1024, 3:2 pull down, 3D Motion Adaptive De-Interlace, and progressive scanning. The resolution can be set to seven different levels: 640 x 480, 800 x 600, 1024 x 768, 1280 x 1024, 1280 x 768, 4:30, and pano-

rama.



TV Box 9 also does closed captioning. The user also has the option of adding external selfamplified speak-

ers instead of using the computer speakers. Headphones may also be used.

With a list price of \$179.99, I found the TV Box 9 on www.pricegrabber.com for as low as \$149.00. It can be found at most computer and consumer electronics stores.

### **Summary**

I found TV Box 9 to be a functional and useful product. The small size allowed for the removal of a monitor from the desktop that was being used to watch television, and create much needed and valuable space. It looks neat too.

This site has photos of many of the stops, including several of the trains going thru residential & business sections of Waukegan in 1947. Look up in the sky, what is it?

If you're an armchair astronomer looking to identify items in your night sky, then **fourmilab.ch/yoursky** (a Swiss website) is for you.

Welcome to Your Sky, the interactive planetarium of the Web. You can produce maps in the forms described for any time and date, viewpoint, and observing location. If you enter the orbital elements of an asteroid or comet, Your Sky will compute its current position and plot it on the map. Each map is accompanied by an ephemeris\* for the Sun, Moon, planets, and any tracked asteroid or comet. A control panel permits customization of which objects are plotted, limiting magnitudes, colour scheme, image size, and other parameters; each control is linked to its description in the help file.

Your Sky provides three ways to view the sky with links, where appropriate, among the various presentations

The sky map shows the entire sky as viewed from a given location at a specified time and date. A stereographic projection is used, as is the convention for printed star maps

Horizon Views shows the stars above the horizon as seen from a specified observing site at a given date and time. The viewing direction (azimuth) may be set to cardinal points on the compass or arbitrarily by entering a value in degrees.

Your Sky's Virtual Telescope is your Humble Soft Telescope of the Web. <u>Controls</u> allow you to set time and date, aiming point, orbital elements to track an asteroid or comet, and a variety of viewing options. You can compose a request with <u>custom settings</u> and save the results in your browser's hotlist or bookmark table, allowing direct access to the virtual telescope with all the controls preset to your own preferences.

Didja get all that? \* don't ask, the definition is longer than this website.

Personally the Heavenly Bodies I prefer are in the pages of *Sports Illustrated, the SwimSuit edition* so this site appealed to me <a href="https://www.sipictures.com/ms\_si/source/CFW/home.aspx">www.sipictures.com/ms\_si/source/CFW/home.aspx</a> especially with this quote "Whether you are looking to capture a defining moment from today's headlines or a classic portrait from our fifty year archive, you will find all those images right here. Searchable by keyword and sport. A wonderful resource for sports lovers, anatomy students, and artists of the human form". Unfortunately, never found the ladies, just great sports photos.

Finally, for stars of a different sort, Broadway, there's BroadwayWorld.com - a daily love-in site with photos of current and past stars, many now appearing on Broadway today along with some of the previous oldies all gathered in groups saying CHEESE to their fans. Great interviews, gossip and show biz. Since benefits, galas and parties occur nightly this site is up to the moment. You can afford seats to this site and they are all front row center.



# **Mozilla Foundation Ships Firefox 1.0**

The wait is over. Get Firefox 1.0, the <u>faster, better web browser</u>. Now available in 27 languages, for Windows, Mac OS X and Linux. "I suggest dumping Microsoft's Internet Explorer"

The Mozilla Foundation announced this morning that it has shipped Firefox 1.0, its long-awaited milestone release of the most popular Web browser alternative. Already in use by several million users in pre-1.0 form, Firefox is expected to garner millions of more users with the 1.0 release and continue eating away at market leader Internet Explorer (IE). Officials from the Mozilla Foundation say that Firefox's popularity is due to two factors: First, it's excellent software. And second, Microsoft has essentially stopped updating the buggy and insecure IE.

But Firefox isn't entirely a recent phenomenon. The genesis of this software began in 1998, when Netscape started Mozilla.org, later renamed to the Mozilla Foundation, to develop open source versions of its browser technology. Initial releases of Mozilla.org browsers were entire browser suites that included e- mail, chat, and other applications, and indeed, the company still issues such a product. About two years ago, several members of the Mozilla Foundation began developing a standalone browser, originally named Phoenix, but later renamed to Firebird and the Firefox after it was discovered that those names were already taken for use in products by other software companies.



Firefox has always impressed technical users. thanks to its advanced features, like tabbed browsing, pop-up blocking, inline searching, and better security. But lately, Firefox has also begun resonating with average

users, many of whom are tired of IE being the primary conduit for malware on their PCs. This year, Firefox and other Mozilla.org browser have raised their market share to 6 percent, up from 3.5 percent in early 2004. Now, the Mozilla Foundation says its goal is to grab at least 10 percent of the market from IE, and with over 8 million downloads of pre-release Firefox downloads under its belt, the organization may very well hit that target.
