



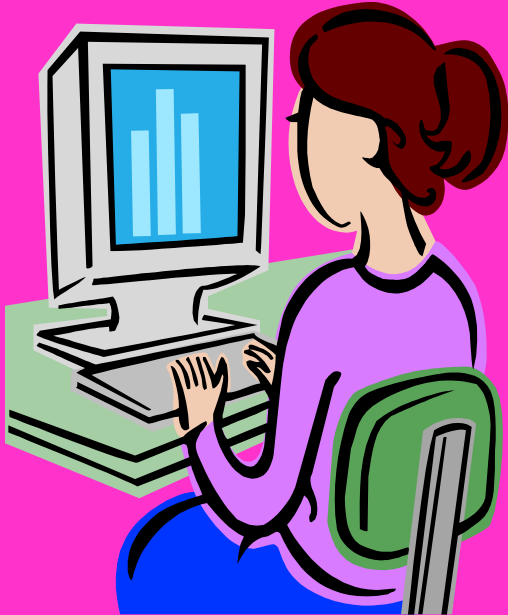

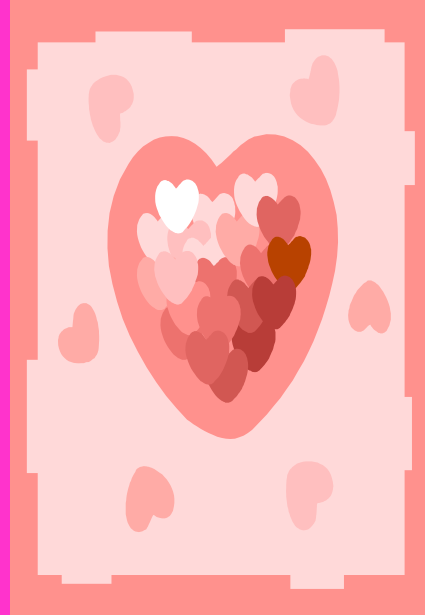

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San Disk 1G MP3 Player

I just bought my SanDisk MP3 player today and with less than 9-hours of operation, the battery still shows only 1/3

TIPS AND TRICKS

Here is a Memory tip and it works. I got this out of Smart Computing so give them credit if you use it, ok? I have been using it for awhile and it makes windows use real memory visе virtual memory and it does put life back in your machine. You might not realize it right away, but programs that seem to run slow sometimes run much better.

Use all your memory. WinXP swaps data into virtual memory (aka your hard drive) even when it doesn't have to, which is why you will get mysterious disk activity in the background even if you have only one application open and a full gig of system RAM. You can force the OS to swap data to disk only when it runs out of volatile memory by adding a line to your System.ini file. Go to the Run dialog box and type **msconfig** to open the System Configuration Utility dialog box. In the System.ini tab, highlight [386enh] and click New to add a new line beneath this branch. Type **ConservativeSwapfileUsage=1** in the empty box that appears, then click Apply and restart your PC. We found that this helped clean up game jerkiness because it reduces the background file swapping that causes video hiccups and pauses.

Big, Bad & Blue

Understand One Of The Most-Feared Types Of Error Messages

The sight this makes many computer users tremble: the BSOD (Blue Screen Of Death). Chances are that if you've used Windows for a while, you have, at one point or another, encountered the BSOD. Even Bill Gates had the misfortune of seeing a BSOD on his computer screen during his Windows 98 presentation at Comdex Spring 1998.

The BSOD is one type of Windows error message. Unlike the error message shown in the last article, the BSOD is a full-screen error message. With its bright blue background and white text, the BSOD is hard to miss. Sometimes it signals that an individual program must shut down. Other times, the BSOD indicates that the error is so grave that the entire system must shut down.

The BSOD exists in Windows 3.1/9x/Me. You will also find something very similar to a BSOD in Windows

NT/2000/XP. These more recent OSes have an error message called a STOP message that looks similar to and has many of the same elements as a BSOD.

Various types of errors may cause a BSOD. For example, a bad device driver, a hardware conflict, or even an error in the Registry may prompt a BSOD. One of the most common causes of a BSOD is that Windows can't boot from the hard drive. Corrupted data on a hard drive can cause a BSOD, as can the installation of incompatible memory modules.

The most common type of BSOD is a fatal exception error, an error that forces the current application to shut down. This happens when an unexpected event, or exception, occurs. If no code exists to handle the exception, the program cannot proceed, and Windows will display a fatal exception error message. With so many possible causes, it helps to understand the parts of a BSOD and its language so you can diagnose the problem.

Type Of Error. The first part of a BSOD tells you what type of error occurred. In most cases, the error is a fatal exception error, an error so great that it requires the offending program close.

Error Code. This two-character DOS code ranges from 00 to 0F. It provides further information about the type of error that occurred. In this example, 0D indicates a general protection fault, an error that is unique and does not meet the definition of any of the other fatal exception types. (Con't page 5)

Memory Address. This string of characters is the memory address. It tells you the precise location of the error in the system memory.

Location Of Error. Here, the BSOD tells you where the error occurred. In this error message, we can see that the problem occurred in a VxD (virtual device driver), a file that manages memory to ensure that programs don't access the same devices simultaneously.

Offending Device Or Program. This is the name of the device, program, or file that prompted the error. In this message, the BSOD tells us that the VFD (virtual floppy disk) caused the error.

Message Body. After the technical information, the BSOD briefly describes, in plain English, what action you should take (or what action will be taken automatically). In the pictured BSOD, because a fatal exception error occurred, the program cannot continue. The BSOD explains that the application will be shut down.

Response Mechanism. Finally, the BSOD offers at least one response mechanism. In this error message, there are two response mechanisms. First, you can press any key to exit the offending program but continue working. This gives you a chance to save open documents before you restart your PC. Second, you can press CTRL-ALT-DELETE to immediately restart your PC. ■

Google Offers Desktop Search Beta

Drawing a line in the sand and offering an interesting contrast with the ever-delayed desktop search feature Microsoft has promised for Longhorn, Google unveiled a beta version of its upcoming Desktop Search tool this week. The tool runs locally but requires a Web browser and appears to look and act just like its Web-based cousin. However, Google Desktop Search searches through your local files and email and provides familiar Google-like search results. The way it works is kind of obvious when you think about it. Best of all, you can search locally and on the Web at the same time. You can try out the excellent Google Desktop Search tool by visiting the Google Web site.

Intel Cancels 4GHz Pentium 4; Will Improve Chips in Other Ways

Intel put the last nail in the coffin of the MHz myth this week when the company canceled plans to ship a long-delayed 4GHz Pentium microprocessor so it can instead concentrate on products with "more bang for the buck." The problem is that chips with faster clock speeds are so much hotter than their predecessors that

they require special cooling hardware. But the chips don't offer a huge performance boost over earlier versions. So instead of ratcheting up the clock speed, as the company has always done with desktop speeds, Intel will now concentrate on more obscure but effective methods of boosting actual processor performance. These efforts will include better utilization of multi-core processors, which effectively put two microprocessors on one chip, and improvements to microprocessor cache and the chipsets that work with the processor. Intel used this tactic with its mobile processor line, the Pentium M processor, which featured slower clock speeds than its predecessors but better performance, battery life, and cooling. Apparently, the Pentium M processor was so successful technically that Intel is now trying the approach with its desktop chips.

Corel Purchases Jasc Software

CorelDRAW and WordPerfect maker Corel announced this week that it's purchasing Paint Shop Pro maker Jasc Software. "We intend to put the powerful R&D resources of the newly combined companies behind the popular Paint Shop family, ensuring that next-generation Paint Shop products will continue to flourish," Corel said in a statement. Corel noted that Paint Shop Pro compares favorably to Adobe Photoshop at just a fraction of the cost. Let's hope that Corel won't be the Kiss of Death (tm) that it's been for WordPerfect. Jasc makes some powerful photo-editing solutions, and it'd be a shame to see Corel mess up the company. Cross your fingers.

Microsoft Files More Lawsuits Against Spammers

This week, Microsoft filed nine new lawsuits against spammers, stepping up its legal battle against unsolicited email. This particular round of lawsuits is notable for several reasons, primarily because some of them target large Web-based hosting companies that Microsoft says are advertising "bulletproof" services for email marketing (i.e., spam). "This is the first action against a Web host catering to spammers," a Microsoft spokesperson said. "They're providing a safe place for spammers to drive customers to." Microsoft is involved in more than 100 legal cases against spammers, more than 70 of which were filed in the United States.

iPod and, to a lesser degree, with the Apple iTunes Music Store. But if you dig a little deeper than the exterior sheen, Microsoft is clearly dominant when it comes to thinking through the end-to-end experiences people want to enjoy with digital media. This week, the company added several important releases to its XP Reloaded campaign, including Windows XP Media Center (XP MCE) 2005, Media Center Extenders, Windows Media Player (WMP) 10 Mobile, and Windows Media Connect, which lets third-party Digital Audio Receivers (DARs) and Digital Media Receivers (DMRs) seamlessly and consistently interact with PC-based media libraries. Combined with previously released products such as Portable Media Centers, WMP 10, and the recently updated MSN Music and scores of other compatible online entertainment, music,

 and video services, Microsoft's approach to digital media--Digital Entertainment Anywhere--is clearly the right one. But the company isn't done yet. Between now and late November, Microsoft will issue other cool XP Reloaded releases, including Media Center for Microsoft Xbox. The company is spending more than \$20 billion over the next 6 years to grab a share of the film and entertainment market, helping ensure that consumers use Microsoft's digital media formats to distribute media electronically in the future.

From the Cook's Corner--2005

Winnie Frost

Family Vegetable Beef Soup

2 pounds ground beef
 1 medium onion, chopped
 1 can (46 ounces) tomato juice
 1 can (28 ounces) diced tomatoes, un-drained
 1 jar (4-1/2 ounces) sliced mushrooms, drained
 2 cups frozen cut green beans
 2 cups each finely chopped celery
 cabbage
 carrots
 1 tsp dried basil
 1/2 tsp garlic powder
 1 tsp salt
 1/2 tsp pepper



In Dutch oven or soup kettle, cook the beef and onion over medium heat until meat is no longer pink then drain. Stir in the remaining ingredients. Bring to boil. Reduce heat, cover and simmer to 2 hours. Yields 14 servings (3-1/2 quarts)

Roast Canada Goose

First send your husband hunting. When he comes home with a goose here is how to cook it.

Wash goose thoroughly. Drain water from cavity, if any blood, wash until no longer drips out. Make Uncle Ben's long grain and wild rice, 2 packages, and stuff with this. Brush vegetable oil (I use Crisco from a bottle) to get crispy skin.

I put in large roasting pan, and sit on a rack and fill the pan with water to just under the rack. (Goose will not be sitting in grease.) Never make gravy from the grease!


Depending upon the size of the goose, you may wish to cook it less. Heat oven to 350. Cook at 350 for the first hour, then at 300 for the next 2 hours.

Fried apples First visit the orchard and pick the apples. Fry 1 apple per person. Gala, Granny Smith or any other firm apple.

Wash apples, (you can peel if you wish)
 Use small amount of butter or margarine in a standard size pan.

Sprinkle with cinnamon or nutmeg.

Fry apples until they soften.



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CAT LITTER CAKE RECIPE

This cake recipe is for anyone who loves cats. It looks like S*%#, but it's actually quite tasty.

CAKE INGREDIENTS

1 box spice or German chocolate cake mix (check box for necessary ingredients)

1 box white cake mix (check box for necessary ingredients)

1 package white sandwich cookies

1 large package vanilla instant pudding mix (check box for necessary ingredients)

A few drops of green food coloring

12 small Tootsie Rolls

SERVING "DISHES AND UTENSILS"

1 **NEW** cat-litter box

1 **NEW** cat-litter box liner

1 **NEW** pooper scooper

Prepare and bake German chocolate cake mix according to box directions, in any size pan and cool.

Prepare and bake white cake mix according to box directions, in any size pan and cool.

Prepare pudding according to box directions and chill.

Crumble cookies in small batches in a blender or food processor.

Add a few drops of green food coloring to 1 cup of cookie crumbs. Mix with a fork or shake in a jar. Set aside.

When cakes are at room temperature, crumble them into a large bowl.

Toss crumbled cakes with half of the remaining cookie crumbs and enough pudding to make the mixture moist, but not soggy.

Place liner in litter box and pour in mixture.

Unwrap 3 Tootsie Rolls and heat in a microwave until soft and pliable. Shape the blunt ends into slightly curved points. Repeat with three more rolls. Bury the rolls decoratively in the cake mixture.

Sprinkle remaining white cookie crumbs over the mix-

ture, and then scatter green crumbs lightly over the top.

Heat 5 more Tootsie Rolls until almost melted. Scrape them on top of the cake and sprinkle with crumbs from the litter box.

Heat the remaining Tootsie Roll until pliable and hang it over the edge of the litter box.

Place the litter box on a sheet of newspaper and serve with the scooper.

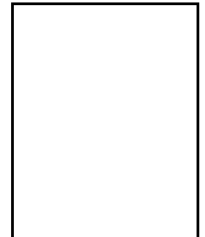
