That is to name but a few of the media available for EUs. Or, how about the method. Local backup or Network backup? What are you supposed to do and still survive costs?

o <u>Reduce Dust On Your PDA Screen</u>: Thanks to static electricity, your PDA screen will attract inordinate amounts of dust in a short period of time. To reduce the amount of dust on your screen, wipe it with a static-cling control sheet that you already sent through the dryer with a load of laundry.

o <u>The Best Type of Projector</u>: Though LCD (liquid-crystal display) projectors dominate the consumer market, another type is available. LCD devices project light through a liquid-crystal screen that controls the brightness and color of each pixel. DLP (Digital Light Processing) projectors, on the other hand, use thousands of tiny mirrors, oscillating to create patterns of light and darkness through colored filters to create an on-screen image. The two technologies are comparably priced (starting at about \$1,200). DLP projectors provide a smoother image but with less brightness, so they're best if you can control room conditions. LCD projectors, however, are probably more versatile under varying conditions. The right type for you depends on the importance of image clarity vs. brightness.

<u>Any Advantages To Using A Docking Station With A Laptop?</u>: A notebook's size, weight, and sturdiness are its main advantages over a desktop PC. But when you finally do get back home or to your office, why not regain the advantages of a desktop? A docking station is like an exoskeleton for your notebook, permanently connected to your office printer, network, full-sized monitor, keyboard, etc. Plug your notebook into it, and all the capabilities of a desktop are instantly yours. Prices and options vary according to notebook model, so your best bet for locating a docking station suitable to your needs is by checking with your notebook's manufacturer.
