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SanDisk introduces 32GB Flash-based notebook drive

The hard drive is a critical component of every modern computer system. It loads and stores practically everything about the computer, from the OS to all the programs to every data bit and document. Yet the hard drive is based on a mechanical spinning disk system that is ultimately prone to failure, usually due to the stress of heat and motion. Laptop hard drives typically take more abuse than their desktop counterparts and therefore have an even higher rate of failure. Fortunately, SanDisk has taken the first steps to potentially ending all of this. The company has developed a new solid-state 32GB hard drive for notebooks that is based entirely on NAND flash RAM.



The 32GB [SanDisk SSD UATA 5000](#) is only a 1.8" form-factor drive, but it has mighty impressive specifications despite its size: 62MB/sec sustained throughput, 0.12ms average access time, and it draws only 0.4 watts. This means that the SanDisk SSD has an average access time that is more than 100 times faster than any notebook hard drive, and it draws 50 to 87 percent less power than most notebook hard drives. While its sustained throughput is roughly on par with most notebooks, it should be noted that the throughput is the same regardless of whether it is reading at the beginning or the end of the drive. (Hard disks typically have higher throughput rates on their outer tracks and slower throughput rates on their inner tracks.) In addition, everything is solid-state, so there are no moving parts. Even if you are the type to drop or bang your laptop around on a regular basis, there are no hard disk heads to crash into spinning platters.

Although flash memory can be known to eventually "wear out" due to writing to the same area repeatedly, modern flash memory controllers have automatic "wear-leveling" to ensure longevity of the device by making sure that sectors are being written to evenly and bad sectors are dynamically remapped to good ones. According to SanDisk, the SSD UATA

somewhat prohibitive at \$600. It would seem that SanDisk's target market is currently the enterprise user, but naturally as flash memory prices continue to come down and more flash manufacturers get into the hard drive business, we should expect to see them in consumer-grade laptops in the proverbial three to five years.

MicroSoft and Ford Combine Products

LAS VEGAS, Jan. 7 — [Bill Gates](#), the chairman of [Microsoft](#), is using the Consumer Electronics Show here to highlight several new consumer-oriented products and to unveil a partnership with the [Ford Motor Company](#) to build Microsoft technology into several Ford models.

The show, the largest trade event in North America, has become an annual forum for Mr. Gates to mix product announcements with computer-filled visions of future Microsoft-based technologies.

In remarks prepared for delivery on Sunday night, the eve of the show, he sought to differentiate Microsoft from other companies by showing how its software products tie together a range of consumer activities including games, interactive television, communications and music. A Microsoft executive briefed reporters on the presentation on Friday.

Among the announcements was the introduction of a hardware upgrade to the [Xbox 360](#) video-game system that will permit the system to deliver the Microsoft interactive television service being offered by partners, including AT&T. The system will duplicate many capabilities of the Media Center version of the Windows operating system, like the ability to record and play back digital video.

Microsoft and Ford are to offer a system called Sync, a voice-activated method for connecting cell-phones and media players — like Microsoft's Zune — to a vehicle. Similar systems are widely available in Japanese and German automobiles. Sync, the first major commercial introduction of the Microsoft Auto software, offers hands-free phone dialing and can read incoming text messages through the car's audio system.

Microsoft is also introducing a consumer software product called Windows Home Server that will be marketed with several partners, including [Hewlett-Packard](#). It will be an appliance-like device that will

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Web users are being urged to upgrade their Adobe reader software as a security flaw is found in older versions of the program.

Millions of people use the reader software to view documents prepared in the popular PDF format.

Security researchers said malicious hackers exploiting the Reader software is used by millions of people could view victim's hard drives or use it to make phishing scams look more plausible.

So far there is no evidence that the bug is being exploited in the wild.

The flaw is found in the web browser plug-in of the Adobe Reader software. Ordinarily this allows PDF documents to be viewed in a browser window.

But by exploiting the flaw hi-tech criminals could use links to PDF files stored on any website to attack vulnerable Windows PCs.

Information about the flaw in the Adobe reader software was first revealed at the annual conference of the Chaos Computer Club - a venerable German hacker group.

Since then security researchers have investigated and found that it could also be used to view files on the hard drive of a vulnerable PC.



Writing about the flaw Symantec security researcher Hon Lau said: "The ease [with] which this weakness can be exploited is breathtaking."

So far no cyber criminals are thought to be actively exploiting the Adobe Reader flaw but code to do so has been produced.

Initially it was thought that only users of the Firefox web browser were at risk but now it is known that Internet Explorer users are vulnerable too.


Upgrading to version 8 of the Adobe Reader software removes the risk of falling victim to the flaw.

connect to a home network and perform functions like network-based backup and media and file-sharing as well as functioning as a Web server. The price will be between \$400 and \$500, according to Microsoft executives. The product will be based on Windows Server 2003, and not the company's newer Windows Vista operating system.

On the program with Mr. Gates was Robbie Bach, the executive in charge of the company's consumer products, to demonstrate game play involving a PC user running Windows Vista competing against a home user playing the game on an Xbox 360. There is no public timetable for such a capability, a company executive said, adding that the feature would not be available for all of the Xbox 360 games.

Another scheduled demonstration involved the current version of the Home of the Future, and installation at Microsoft headquarters with prototypes of home-oriented technologies. Applications chosen for the spotlight were radio-frequency ID tags and displays for the walls of children's bedrooms using organic light-emitting diodes.

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The Hidden Costs of DIY Printing

If companies like Kodak really want us to buy their printers to make prints, then they're going to have to think a bit harder about making it an economical choice. This epiphany came to me as I spent the holidays using Kodak's new EasyShare printer. Don't get me wrong—the new EasyShare G600 printer is marvelous. It's a dye-sublimation printer that lets you dock your Kodak camera or use a variety of transfer options from USB or memory cards. The printer is compact (it even has a carrying handle and can run on optional batteries) and does simple editing, including red-eye reduction. The dye-sublimation technology prints gorgeous 4x6 photos, and it's a cinch to use.



But if you do any sort of cost calculation, you'd need your head examined to use it.


I learned this the hard way when a friend with a new baby and a new Kodak EasyShare camera stopped by to show off the camera (and the baby). "Hey," I said, "I'm looking at the EasyShare G600 printer docking station for a review right now. I could make you a print and see how it looks." Famous last words. It turns out that I had already made eight prints, and my demo pack and ink cartridge were used up.

Eight prints from one ink cartridge? It turns out that one of the "features" of the new Kodak docking station printer is that each package of paper has an ink cartridge that's good for—get this—just as many pieces of paper as are in the package. My eight-pack was gone, and so was my ink (despite the fact that I had plenty of 4x6 photo paper at home).

You can get larger packs of ink/paper, but because every cartridge and paper pack lasts just as long as the paper, it was easy for me to figure out what a print costs. A replacement Kodak Photo Paper Kit with 50 sheets of paper and the ink cartridge is available for \$25. That's 50 cents a print. Yikes! I went to [Kodak EasyShare PhotoGallery](#) to check the price of ordering 4x6 prints online, and it was only 15 cents a print. At rival online service SnapFish, a 4 x 6 print

is 12 cents, with the first 20 prints free for new members. At [Walgreens](#), prints also cost about 12 cents each, but if you submit online you can pick up the photos an hour later at a store near you. And in-store kiosks at places such as Wal-Mart and CVS, where you stand at the photo kiosk in the store, insert your memory card, and make your prints, are also under 15 cents a print.

Sure, there are advantages to having your own printer and immediate gratification, but there are advantages to using online services, too, such as sharing your photos with far-flung relatives immediately and getting free storage space. While Kodak's newest printer makes it really simple to print fabulous photos, I'd say the pricing scheme needs further investigation. What about you? Are you printing at home or using the online services or in-store kiosks?


