too many unnecessary things like this running in the background, it will slow down your computer.

Also, whenever you visit websites, they make copies of things and store them in so-called temporary files. The files are called temporary, but they remain there until you remove them.

For example; Internet Explorer saves things in a number of categories. BTW, if you have more than one user that can login to your computer, these files are saved separately for each different user. Each web browser program (Internet Explorer, Chrome, Firefox) maintains a similar list of files.

In any case, it is a good idea from time to time to clean up the registry, stop unnecessary background programs, and remove temporary files. A useful free program to keep your computer tidy is CCleaner. This program has options for taking care of the issues mentioned earlier.

If you have already installed CCleaner, jump to the update section.

Installing CCleaner

When you go to the CCleaner download web page you will see three different versions of-fered.

After you select the Download option, a dialog box will pop up that lets you save the install file.



The install program will open an install window that might have a check box that, if not unchecked, will install other software. Watch out for this. Select the Custom install option and select how you would like CCleaner to be installed.



Using CCleaner

There is a vertical list of options on the left side of the CCleaner window. The Cleaner option allows you to toggle different things to be removed. For example, if you do not want to remove Cookies, or browsing History, select the check marks to toggle the options off. Near the top of the window is a button that has a similar list of options for other applications.



If you select the Analyze button near the bottom of the CCleaner window, the program will go through the motions without deleting any files. It will, however, give you a report of what will be removed if you select the Run Cleaner button.

Cleaning the Registry

When you select the Registry button in CCleaner, you will see two buttons near the bottom of the Window; Scan for Issues and Fix selected issues. After you have scanned for issues, you will see a list of things the system detected. If you then select the Fix selected issues button, you will have the option to backup registry changes. Select yes, and then select Fix All Selected Issues option. It is a good idea to repeat the Scan for Issues option until no issues are found.

Checking the Startup Programs

CCleaner provides an option to check what programs start running when Windows is first started. In most cases, there are programs that you do not want to always be running in the background.

Select the Tools button in CCleaner, then select the Startup option. Locate a program that you do not want running in the background and right click on Yes, then select Disable. Note that the Disable option does not uninstall the program. It simply removes it from the list of programs that run in the background.

DJI Spark Drone

Drone selfies are cool, but gestures is even better

I recently added a new toy to my toy box. I've been playing around with drones for a few years now and my fist one flew for about thirtyseconds before I crashed it into the neighbors house. My next drone never made it outside because it was too hard to control. Therefore I've spent the last several month looking and researching the market. The prices of drones have been steadily declining and the technology has been increasing. From my previous experience I knew I wanted a drone with GPS tracking satiability, which allows it to hover in place and not fly off.

I've been following a nifty little compact selfie drone called the HoverCam on KickStart and the price was recently drastically decrease, but the reviews weren't that great. Then I started reading about the new DJI Spark drone. DJI had been a front runner for sometime with there Phantom and most recent Mavric drone. The Spark has taken the intelligence of the Mavric and put it into the reasonable priced Spark.

The DJI Spark is a lightweight (0.55 lbs) design and has as excellent two-gimbal mechanically stabilized camera. But most important is the gesture control and obstacle detection and avoidance. The flight time is about 16 minutes and can be controlled from you smartphone or the optional controller.

Since I purchased it a few days before our winter weather, I've only had one opportunity to fly it outside, but for the short experience it was fun and I was able to take a few great photos and videos. Can't wait for better weather to take some travel aerial photos and videos.

But until then let me tell you about other features of the Spark. As I mentioned gesture control allows you to hand launch the drone and control it with hand and arm gestures. I will follow your hand, left, right, up or down. Wave at the Spark and it will fly away from you and a had frame gesture tells it to had a photo. This is just one of several other gestures that you can use to control the drone.

If you want more control, the controller pairs with your smartphone and now you can see what the Spark sees. Like any other aircraft you have full control and with GPS stability your Spark knows where its and at all times. The controller is easier to use than your smartphone and give you more range. One of the best features of the Spark is the Return to Home (RTH) with their push of a button, the Spark will return to where it took off from. Also if you loose signal or the battery gets to a low point that you set, the Spark will return home automatically.

In an outdoor environment, the Spark will inform you about how many satellites that it is tracking. You are also warned not t fly if you tracking less that 10. You are also warned or restricted area like airports. All this is visual on you screen as will as height and distant traveled.

The Good The DJI Spark delivers a tiny, lightweight design; excellent mechanically stabilized camera; USB charging and advanced features like gesture controls and obstacle detection. It travels well and is great for aerial photos and video.

The Bad Flight time can be as short as 10 to 14 minutes. The app can be frustrating to use, especially on smaller screens. And you should expect to buy batteries and possibly the optional controller.

The Bottom Line The DJI Spark delivers all of the camera drone features most people will ever need in an impossibly small package.

I try to remember to fully charge my phone before the event but sometimes forget. This is not my first Battery Charger, but this is the first All-In-One charger I've purchased.

Now I have the PhoneSuit Journey All-In-One Charger as my backup. The reason this is an All -In-One charger is besides the high density 3500mAh battery cell, it has a built-in Lightning cable for your iPhone, iPad and a Micro-USB cable to charge other Smartphones, Tablets, Bluetooth, Speakers and more. This means that you don't have to carry an extra cable.

In addition there's a USB Output and Input Port to allow you to connect your own USB cable to charge virtually any device or the charge the Journey by USB as well. The built-in wall charger folds neatly into the Journey so you can plug it into a AC outlet.

By using the two integrated cables and the USB output port, you can charge up to three devices at the same-time. The PhoneSuit Journey is also available in 5000 and 10000mAh units. Depending in where you purchase, prize range from \$29.00 to \$59.00
