

Transferring and Preserving Photos

Transferring and preserving photos is probably the single most common activity that practically all of us perform. Let's break this into two parts -A) the actual transfer of the picture files; B) how to store them.

A) The source of pictures can be varied, although I'm sure the most common today is via Smart Phone. The most common way to transfer pictures from a phone is to use a direct USB cable connection. The phone usually appears as a storage drive to the Windows file explorer and allows you to identify those files that need to be manipulated (copied/moved/deleted/edited/ etc.) as you would with any file stored on any of your storage drives. They may also come from an actual camera using a storage card or even through a direct WiFi connection that is available on some models. Of course, pictures may also originate as email attachments or as downloads from web sites. Some of these allow direct transfer to a directory/library/folder located on your local PC.

B) By default, Windows 10 creates a folder called Pictures for each user account on a PC. This allows each user to maintain their library of files separate from other users on the same PC.

As with any collection of files, you want to think about how to organize them into sub-folders to allow for easy access later. The fact that picture files from phones and cameras will have additional information stored internally, such as the date and place the picture was taken, which will allow for ease of searching and categorizing later. This information is stored as part of the picture file as an Exchangeable image file format for digital still cameras (EXIF) standards. The storage can be on whatever is convenient and appropriate for what you want to do with them.

So for ease of portability, a USB memory stick can be ideal – cheap and readable by practically any device with a USB port. An SD memory card is common in many cameras and the micro SD card is commonly used in many other types of devices, such as android phones and other recording devices. CDs and DVDs were quite common ways to backup pictures a few years ago, but they have fallen out of use due to accessibility, speed, capacity, longevity, and cost considerations.

Of course, the best way today to ensure that you can always access your pictures is to use one of the many cloud services, many of which are already tied to your phone and PC. Refer to the April 2020 journal for a complete discussion of cloud storage options. If you have suggestions for topics that you would like to see explained, please let me know!


I hope that everyone has been successful in avoiding our coronavirus pandemic while still managing to enjoy the summer and stay in touch with family and friends – virtually if not in person!



Like many of us, I have spent an above-average amount of time on my tablet or computer because of being confined to my home. Our new reality for communicating with friends and family because of social distance has relied on virtual meetings. Socially distancing had given me the ability to interact and meet new people.

I have enjoyed being able to continue meeting with members of my computer club, Honor Flight friends, and my former coworkers and I still virtually meet and chat every two weeks. This would have been the 48th annual family reunion which we had to cancel this year, but I was able to round up over fifty family members for a virtual meeting. We have plans for another meeting in a couple of weeks.

None of this could have been accomplished without new technology, and our smartphone, tablets or computers have made all this possible. For some of use, virtual meetings have been a new adventure and for others, it was second nature. Many of us have been using this technology for some time in the form of SMS texting, Facebooking, Tweeting, and even just a simple phone call with some of these new technology devices.

I have found myself locked into the Zoom meeting several times a week and have acquired a new condition called a "Zoom Butt" from sitting at my computer for meetings that have exceeded 3-hours. Therefore, I have updated my office to make it more suitable and comfortable for these long sessions.

As the moderator for some of these sessions, it is important that I be as comfortable as possible. Therefore, my priority was to obtain a more comfortable chair. Ensuring that my chair is set at the right height and I have the right angle to view my monitors will ensure I do not end up with neck strain after these sessions.

To make my sessions more enjoyable I set up a dual-monitor system. This allows me to see the presentation/speaker on one monitor and the gallery/chat session on the other. The number of people I can see in the gallery depends on my computer process and I have an Intel I7 processor, there-



fore, I'm able to see up-to forty-nine a once and I've attended a few meeting with over one-hundred attendees. In this case I must scroll to another screen to see all attendees.

I have chosen the Logitech C920 webcam with the built-in microphone, and it is mounted on a gooseneck holder enabling me to adjust it to eye-level. This view gives me eye contact with the monitor screen and the viewers not looking up my nose and trying to count the number of hairs. Although the camera has a built-in microphone, sometimes I perfect to use my USB headset with an attached microphone.

I am presently developing some online/virtual training lessons and I have the means to connect up to three different cameras to my system. This will give me views of the keyboard, myself, and other peripherals I am using to create my presentation. I can switch between views with just the touch of a button

Lighting is also very important for a good virtual meeting. I have seen too my attendees with a bright light behind them, and being back lite, you cannot see their face. Front lighting is essential, and it is best if you can control it. LED Ring Lights have become extremely popular and are inexpensive. The ring light I use allows me to control the brightness of the lights. It does not matter which type of light you use, just get some type of light in front of you.

More and more people are learning about the Virtual Backgrounds available during Zoom meeting. They are nice but can be distracting. These backgrounds are meant to be used with a green-screen backdrop and if you do not use one, then take into consideration your movements and what you are wearing when using a virtual background. Quick movement and some clothing will make you appear to be GHOST-ING to other attendees.

I recently attended a Zoom presentation and the host kept moving his hands in front of my camera and after a short period of time it became very distracting. I texted him and apparently, he got my note and stopped. Just as distracting are attendees moving

away from their computer/tablet and walking off. Remember that everyone is seeing you so consider stopping the video (turns off the camera) until you return.

Like others, I've grabbed a piece of paper to take notes during the meeting, but recently with the two-monitor configuration I've realized that I can launch Microsoft Word and take notes or even easier I just use my iPad Pro to take notes.

It appears that this will be our means of staying in touch with friends and family for the future, therefore, make your experience as comfortable as you can and add the technology you need to keep connected.

Although, there are several options for conducting these virtual meetings. Take the time to learn the ins and out of the program. Learn the etiquette of a virtual meeting and stay SAFE and HEALTHY until we are back together in reality.





How to Take a Screenshot on Any Device

Here's everything you need to know about capturing screenshots, no matter the platform—Windows,




If you need to preserve what you're seeing on your phone or computer screen, mobile and desktop operating systems offer robust screen-capture tools. Most tools are built-in, but there are a wealthy of third-party options, as well as browser extensions that also do the job. Here's how to take a screenshot on An-

How to Take a Screenshot on iPhone or iPad

If you own an Apple device that still has a Home button (like the 2020 iPhone SE), hold down the sleep/wake button and press the Home button to take a screenshot. You will hear a camera shutter (if your sound is on) and see a "flash" on the screen. The screenshot will then appear in your Camera Roll and in the Screenshots album.

For devices without a Home button—the iPhone X and iPhone 11 lines, iPhone XR, and iPad Pro—hold down the



If you're using an Apple Pencil with iPadOS, you can take a screen grab with the drawing tool. Simply swipe up from the bottom corner of the screen with the Apple Pencil to capture the image. You can also choose between just your current screen or the entire page, even after the picture has been taken.

If you need to annotate a screenshot, tap the small thumbnail that appears at the bottom of the screen once you capture a screenshot. This will open the device's markup tool and allow you to edit the screengrab.

Some apps may make it difficult to take screenshots through the normal means. This is where your device's built-in Screen Recording tool comes in. While

its primary purpose is to record video of your screen, you can pause the video and take a screenshot this way.

You can also use a third-party tool to capture the screen of your mobile device from a computer. With the LonelyScreen tool, you share your screen via AirPlay and record or take screenshots of anything on you mobile device's screen from the computer. Apowersoft's iPhone/iPad Recorder can work as long as the PC and mobile device are on the same Wi-Fi network. Activate the AirPlay connection in Control Center, then record video and stills on a computer.

How to Take a Screenshot on Android

Android devices are not as uniform as iPhone and iPad, so screenshot commands may be different depending on the phone's manufacturer. Most Android devices should be able to take screen grabs by holding down the power and volume down buttons, though holding the power and home buttons (if your device has a physical button) may also work. Devices running Android 10 can also hold down the power button, then select Screenshot from the menu.

Several Android devices also have a screenshot button in the pull-down Quick Settings menu. If your phone has Google Assistant or Bixby (Samsung), you can use a voice command to ask the voice assistant to take a screenshot for you. For Samsung devices with the S Pen stylus, you can take a screen grab from the Air Command menu by tapping Screen Write. You can then write on or



Samsung phones also support gestures to take screenshots. Navigate to the screen image you like, position your hand like you plan to karate chop the phone, then swipe the entire side of your hand along the screen from right to left. Set this up (or turn it off) in **Settings** > **Advanced Features** > **Palm swipe to capture.**

No matter what device you have, all Android users can download third-party apps to take screen captures. Many apps meant for recording video can also take screenshots. Screenshot Easy is a top-rated option that

uses the same basic triggers as Android itself; you can also customize it and take a screenshot just by shaking your phone.

To take screens of what's transpiring on your Android device on a PC, check out <u>Apowersoft's Android Recorder</u>. The app lets you cast your phone or tablet screen to a Windows or macOS machine for easy capture of stills and video. It requires Android 5.0 and above.

How to Take a Screenshot on Apple Watch

Did you know you can take a screenshot of your Apple Watch screen? First, the feature must be enabled. Open the Watch app on your iPhone or iPad, and navigate to My Watch > General > Enable Screenshots and toggle it on.



Take a screenshot on an Apple Watch by pulling up the screen you want to capture. Hold the Side Button and click the Digital Crown simultaneously. Like on iPhone, the screen will "flash" white and the camera shutter will go off. The screenshot will then appear on your iPhone Camera Roll, not the watch itself.

How to Take a Screenshot on Wear OS

If you have a smartwatch made by Fossil, Huawei, Motorola, or Samsung, it runs on Google's Wear OS. Taking a screenshot on your Wear OS device is now much easier than it used to be because you use an app on your phone to do the work.


Open the Wear OS app, hit the three-dot menu and choose **Take screenshot of watch**. You will receive a notification on your phone allowing you to save or share the image via the supported apps.

How to Take a Screenshot in Windows 10

The simplest way to <u>take a screenshot in Windows</u> is to use the Print Screen button. You'll find it on the upperright side of most keyboards. Tap it once and it will seem

like nothing happened, but Windows just copied an image of your entire screen to the clipboard. You can then hit Ctrl+V to paste it into a program, be it a Word document or an image-editing program.

The problem with this method is it captures everything visible on your monitor, and if you have a multi-monitor setup, it will grab all the displays as if they're one big screen. You can narrow things down with Alt+Print Screen, which will capture just the window you currently have open.



Windows also has multiple built-in tools that can help you take more precise screen grabs. The Snipping Tool can be found in the Start menu, which will provide a small toolbar to capture multiple types of screenshots. Grab just the area you want with a rectangular capture area, select a specific window to capture, or get the entire screen in one shot. Once a screenshot is taken, it is moved to the Snipping Tool editor, where you can save and edit the image.

Another option is Snip & Sketch, which was introduced with the <u>Windows 10 May 2019 update</u> and is expected to eventually replace the Snipping Tool. Launch this program by using the Shift+Windows Key+S keyboard shortcut. This will launch a small toolbar at the top of the screen so you can easily choose what to capture.



One more built-in option for screen grabs is the Windows Game Bar. Though it is intended to record gaming sessions, it can be used to record any action and capture screen grabs. Open the tool with Windows Key+S and tap the camera button in the Broadcast & capture section to save a screenshot to the Videos/Captures folder under your main user folder. If all that fails, Windows has anarray of third-party screencapture utilities available. The best option is Snagit, which costs a whopping \$50. Of course it'll do everything you can imagine, even take video of what's happening on your screen. You can find plenty of screenshot apps for free, though. Jing, by the makers of Snagit, also does screencast videos and makes sharing what you capture easy. LightShot is a nifty and small utility that takes over the PrtScrn key and makes it easy to capture and share.

How to Take a Screenshot on Chromebook

If you own a <u>Chromebook</u>, you can take a screenshot with help from the laptop's Window Switch Key. This button is located at the top of the keyboard and has an image of a box with lines next to it. Hit Ctrl+Window Switch Key to take a full-screen snapshot. You will see the notification on the lower right of the screen.

Enter Ctrl+Shift+Window Switcher to get just a section of the screen. The cursor becomes cross-hairs you can use to select what you'd like to capture.



If you're using a standard keyboard—not a Chromebook keyboard—you won't see a Window Switcher button. You'll need to Ctrl+F5 and Ctrl+Shift+F5 instead. When using your Chromebook in tablet mode, you can take screenshots without the use of the keyboard. Press the power and volume down buttons to snap a picture, though this method can only be used to capture the entire screen.

All the images are saved as PNG files on the computer's local Downloads folder. If you wish to preserve these screenshots permanently, you must upload them to <u>Google Photos</u> or back them up in <u>Google Drive</u>.

Since 90 percent of what you do on a Chromebook probably takes place in the Chrome web browser, you can also utilize a number of Chrome extensions.

Screenshots in Web Browsers

Chrome, Firefox, Safari, and Edge all support add-ons that extend browser usability. Here are a few programs you can download that have browser extensions. Use these add-ons to put screen-capture utilities right into the browser.

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<u>LightShot</u>is free and works on Windows and Mac, but can also be added as <u>Chrome</u> and <u>Firefox</u> extensions.

<u>FireShot</u> is a paid (\$59.95) capture program that works with a browser or email client. It will capture and allow instant edits, sharing via social media, or instant saves to the computer. There are also <u>Chrome</u>, <u>Firefox</u>, and <u>Edge</u> extensions

<u>Awesome Screenshot</u> is a free program that captures a whole page or a section, and then quickly annotates it (or blurs out the naughty bits) before sharing instantly. There are extensions for <u>Chrome</u>, <u>Firefox</u>, and <u>Edge</u>.

Nimbus Screen Screenshot is free and will let you capture the whole screen or just parts of it. You can also use it to draw, make annotations, or mark up those same images. There are Chrome and Firefox extensions.

<u>Page Screenshot</u> is a paid (\$2.99) extension for Safari users that can capture the full length of a website or just a specific section. Once a screen grab is taken, the program opens Preview for easy editing.

Attola USB 3.0 7-Port Hub

A speed power hub for expanding your connectivity

I just cannot seem to have enough USB outlets on my computer. I had a 4 port USB 2.0 connected and was able to connect most of my devices until the pandemic and there was a need for more connectivity for webcams and microphones, external



hard drives, and my 1TB ScanDisk SSD. This is also a convenient way to access my project flash drives, allowing me to easily transfer files between them or the computer.

After searching the web for a replacement, I can across the Atolla Hub 7-Port USB Hub with individual On/Off Switches on Amazon. Since my original purchase, I have acquired a second Atolla Hub. Now you may be asking why a second hub, well you will have to see my main computer station to understand all the connections I need.

This is an expansion USB 3.0 and I powered to allow charging of my smartphone and tables as well as communication with my computer. With 7-USB data ports, it supports a data transfer up to 5Gpbs. It is backward compatible with USB 2.0 and I have had no problem connecting older devices. The 1 smart USB charging port provides a 2.4A for charging my smartphone or tablets or any other device that needs charging.

The individual On/Off switches control the USB ports and save the trouble of unplugging devices whenever I don't need them, Whether I'm turning off my graphic table or putting a hard drive to sleep, I just simply press the button. Each port has a blue LED light to indicate it is on/off status.

During my research, I discovered Atolla also has a 4-port USB 3.0 hub which sells for about \$13.99, but I opted for the 7-port hubs for \$28.99. I have been completely satisfied with my purchase and would recommend these hubs to anyone looking to expand the connectivity of their computer.

hat does an old computer nerd do when he has too much time on his hands? He digs out his old computers of course. A couple of weeks ago I started to look through my old Atari computers and try to decide what to do with them. The first question was, do they even still work? Second, do I have anything to view them on? Third, do I want to keep them, donate them, sell them or scrap them?



My original Atari
800XL computer
(with a whopping
256K upgrade) still
works. The second
one I have failed to

start up. I also have a XEGS (Basically a 65XE with detachable keyboard sold as a gaming system). I have too many various floppy drives to list here. I haven't checked them yet. Two are the more rare XF551s.

The 8-bit computers were designed to work with either an RF video signal, think plug it into the same place that you plug in the old rabbit ears. Or you can use a video cable that gives you a composite out signal. That's the old yellow plug that some of your old TVs used to have. I actually have a couple of TVs that have this connection. I also found an interesting alternative. If you have the composite



cable ,there is a composite to HDMI adapter box that lets you hook your computer up to a modern TV. It was only \$16.00 on Amazon. It actually gives a fairly good picture.

I have two ST computers. Both seem to start OK. My original <u>520 STFm</u> was upgraded to 4mb. The



other one is a stock 1040 STFm. I also have a great big external hard drive box (about 24" x 24" x 8"). It has a 120gb hard drive, 120gb Syquest removable drive, CD drive and a tape backup drive. I thought it was, pretty cool in its day. I have at least, one Color monitor and a couple of Mono chrome monitors. At one time I had a VGA Multisync monitor that would show all three of the ST resolutions. I made a special switch box that converted the Atari ST video out to the two different pin configurations that the VGA monitor needed. This box still works for viewing mono mode on any VGA monitor (it used a standard sync signal). The color mode needs a 15hz sync signal. Very few monitors have this. I did some reading and



found another converter box on Amazon (what did we ever do before Amazon?) It is supposed to upconvert the color signal to the standard 75hz signal. I'll let you know if it works. It's supposed to give a really clear signal. Just think of watching your

Atari ST game on a 30" LCD TV.



Thanks to Carl, I also have an Atari TT. Last time I checked it out it worked fine. It is designed to work with a VGA monitor. I have some other ideas rattling around in my brain. See the next article for those ideas.

iPad Pro 2020 (12.9 inch)

The best tablet money can buy. And it has replaced my laptop by Randy Johnson, Sr.

My new iPad Pro (12.9") has become my tablet/ laptop of choice. I'm not always working at my office desk, so when I'm researching subjects and need to read material for a newsletter article or Zooming, I'm in my favorite chair in the living room with my iPad Pro 12.9". It is indispensable for the work that I do, and it is my preferred content consumption device for movies and TV.

I have concluded that the iPad Pro has been one of the best tablets I have purchased over the years. It has a blazing sped and long battery life. Although it has an improved camera, this is not one of the reasons for my purchase.

With the addition of the Magic Keyboard, the iPad Pro has become more of a quasi-computer and not a tablet on steroids. It has now become my go-to laptop. The Magic Keyboard with trackpad has become a great accessory, and the new iOS even allows me to use a Bluetooth mouse, so I added the Logitech MX mouse to my arsenal. Since the iPad uses a smart connector on the back to connect to the Magic Keyboard has a USB-C charging port, therefore you can use the USB-C port on the tablet for other connectivity.

The trackpad allows me to use all the gestures without having to touch the screen, therefore fewer fingerprints on the screen. The coolest part of the



Magic Keyboard is the floating design that makes it appears as the iPad is just hovering above the keyboard.

I have also added the Apple Pencil (second-generation) and although I purchase one with my previous iPad, this version is well worth the price, and I find myself using it more. Its magnetic attaches to the top of the iPad where it automatically charges. Just tapping on the screen with the pencil wakes up the Notes app. I have been able to achieve a good day or work and play with the 10-hour battery life.

If you're in the market for a new tablet, then I would highly recommend the iPad Pro 12.9 for those who want a tablet first and a laptop second, and the Magic Keyboard is a must to turn this iPad into a truly functional laptop.

Fitbit announced the release of their Fitbit Sense (\$329) with 3 new sensors for temperature, ECG, and stress. 

As I was contemplating this solution, I received an email from Western Digital promoting their new line of SanDisk Ultra Dual Drives. These new Dual Drives allows me to move and transport files from the Type-A connection on my computer to the Type -C connector on my new iPad.

With the new OS 13 on the iPad, I can easily import, export, or view files on the tablet. Even though I have 512GB of storage on the iPad, an extra 512GB of external file storage is a plus.

Now I'm able to carry files that I don't necessarily need at all times on my iPad, but I would still like to have access to them on occasion, like videos, photos. I have a large collection of ebooks for photography and training videos from one of the photo magazines that I now can carry with me.

This may not be something that everyone needs in their toybox, but it comes in useful if you are a paper junkie. I need a new way to scan books and this desktop camera scanner impressed me.

I bought the IRIScan Pro a few months ago, JJ mentioned it in his Scanner 101 presentation last year. I have a collection of several cooking magazines and old books that can't be flattened and this scanner works GREAT!



Some of my cooking magazines were too large for my flatbed scanner and with the IRIScan Desk Pro I was able to lay the magazine flat on the scanning bed and the overhead scanner made perfect copies of each or both pages as desired.

The Desk 5 nimbly scans books and magazine spreads, automatically scanning in intervals of 3, 5, or 7 seconds; automatically detection of documents; Book digitizing (including auto page-turn detection, book curve image flattening, finger-erasing, and front and back cover detection) automatic deskewing and cropping, and automatic edge filling of damaged documents. Hand movement detection with automatic scanning when my hand disappears.

The Auto-Detect Page Turn and Auto Scan is the brain of the Desk 5 Pro. This software auto-detects page turn and can trigger scan automatically for effortless scanning. The convenient Push Button can also be used to trigger scanning, while it frees your hands.


Desk 5 can scan at 2 seconds per page or 30 pages per minute. The document can later be saved as a

pdf (eBook) file. You can also scan documents, ID and other cards, and some 3D objects. The Desk 5 is powered through USB to connect to



your PC and also the second USB port for scanning directly to thumb drives or other USB devices. Additional software includes IRIS OCR.

Now my wait time for the flatbed scanner to boot up, I just place my document however I like under the IRIScan Desk and it will create perfectly straight, flat, and legible files from them, at any time, in a split second!

Since we are technology users, whether beginners or gurus, there are ways for our groups to serve the members. Many groups have already used Zoom to have APCUG Speakers' Bureau presentations. Skype is another service for remote presentations.



You can test using Zoom for free. The free account can accommodate 100 users (including the owner and any presenters) for 40 minutes. The Pro plan is \$15 per month (\$180 per year) for 100 participants and up to a

24-hour meeting. One member is the owner or host of the account and must sign in for others to participate. Zoom is quite easy to use and requires a very small file to download and use.

Participants can join a Zoom meeting using any of the following: Windows, Mac, Linux, Android, iOS, & more. You can connect with a phone for just audio or use a phone for the audio portion and your computer for the video.

If your group is not a member of APCUG, it is time to join. Member benefits include the Speakers' Bureau, https://apcug2.org/speakers-bureau/ . The Speakers Bureau features almost 100 Webinar presentations in 20+ categories. Be sure to scroll to the bottom of the page for an overview of what many of the speakers present.



An International Association of Technology & Computer User Groups

To have a member of the Speakers Bureau present to your group, your group may not need to have their own Zoom account. Using Zoom is free to the participant, with up to 100 people online. If you want your

members to present and to hold question and answer sessions, you will need a group account and plan. All that is needed is a device, a microphone and speakers (a headset is best), and internet access.



If you are hesitant to do your own presentation, you can have your usual business meeting, q & a, and then play a YouTube video, perhaps one of the over 180 APCUG Virtual Conference presentations on the APCUG YouTube channel https://www.youtube.com/ user/APCUGVideos.

If your group has not presented with Zoom or has not used the service, I suggest that you try the free version with a small group to get the feel of it. You can even use Zoom for your Board of Directors meetings.

There is ample help available through APCUG and many of us who use Zoom. There are many YouTube videos to help with understanding Zoom should you need it. There is even a YouTube Zoom Channel at https://www.youtube.com/user/ZoomMeetings/ featured.

Another benefit of holding an online meeting is that you can record the meeting and then upload the recording to YouTube, for members who were not able to attend at the original time can still see the meeting and presentation. Your group can create its own channel on YouTube to store your recordings in one place. Tech Talk: TV Slideshows, Printer Fix, and Beta Software

Q. Is there a way to view personal photos on my television?

A. A living room TV is a perfect venue to share your family photo col-lection, and there are choices to fit every budget.

Many televisions built in the last decade can already display photos. Older TVs may have a memory card slot. Simply load photos onto a card and enjoy! This is also the best choice if your house does not have a W-Fi network.

The bundled software installed in SmartTV s often support photo sharing via home networking.

If your set lacks any built-in features or if they seem too complex to navi-gate, consider a hardware add-on. Two inexpensive options are the Amazon Fire TV Stick and Google Chromecast. Each are available for about \$30, and they simply plug into any HDMI port on the TV. They also require a power outlet, although most advertising pho-tos omit that important element. Either one will do a fine job.

Slightly more costly (about \$50) is the Roku Streaming Stick. Roku was an early leader in streaming TV and alongside the programming options the stick can run an app that displays images from Google Photos.

The most expensive option only makes sense if you are already deeply invested in the Apple iCloud Photo Library, or if you want a device that does a lot more than display photos in your living room. My advice is to follow the path of least resistance. Amazon fans should go with a Fire Stick, Google Photos fans can use any of these devices, and if you do not yet have a preference, choose the least expensive one just to get started. Once you set up photo slideshows on your TV, you will be hooked.

Q. I have a Canon MX922 printer.

The printer was working just fine until we began to get paper abrasion mes-sages. Can you tell me what to do?

A. Troubleshooting printers is espe-cially challenging because there are so many different models, configurations, and computer systems in the mix. But there are universal techniques which apply to this type of problem.

For example, that model has a print-er driver setting that adjusts the paper path to handle thicker papers, and once the setting is enabled, it will stay on until it is explicitly turned off again. I would look into that first.

If there is a specific error message, I search for that message in Google, enclosed in quotation marks. If the results are not helpful, I try to focus the search with additional words outside the quoted message, words such as "turn off or "disable."

The next step would be to visit the support section on Canon's website, usa.canon.com, which has quite a bit of freely accessible material for your model printer. Enter "MX922" into the site's search box to view the resources I am looking at as I write this.

Unfortunately, tech support has become very much a **DIY** skill. For better and worse, solutions are usually available online, but they require patience to find them.

Q. Do you recommend using public beta software?
A. Absolutely not. No. Never. Ever. In the last few years summer has become public beta season, with both Apple and Google releasing public beta versions of their future major updates, which usually arrive in the fall as full-fledged releases.

Of course anyone enthusiastic about tech wants to get his or her hands on the new new thing as quickly as possi-ble. But there is a significant risk associated with beta software, even if you keep excellent backup copies.

Every one of these beta releases comes with a warning that they are for testing purposes only, and the manu-facturers will not help recover from any problems you encounter.

There is another danger with beta releases.

As our devices have become more dependent on cloud services, the inter-action between cloud data and beta software is less reliable.

When it comes to public beta software, leave the testing to the professionals and wait until the official release.
