I recently had a use for an additional phone number. Google Voice to the rescue! It's free (for calls within the U.S.), works nicely, and is easy to use. Here is what I learned in the process.

What is Google Voice? Google Voice is a software tool that allows you to obtain a free phone number. It can't be your only phone number and you need a Google account. You can set up a Gmail account for free if you don't already have one. It doesn't require any hardware or physical phone (other than what you already own).

Why would you want an additional phone number? Here are a few reasons:

- You temporarily want a phone number that you can delete later.
- You want a phone number for a different U.S. city.
- You have a side gig, perhaps selling hand-crafted items, and don't want to use your own phone number for that business.

You want a phone number for specific people to use, such as family members.

I recently read of two teachers in Maryland who set up a Google Voice phone number for seniors to call if they needed help setting up a Covid vaccination appointment. The possibilities are endless.





3rd Quarter 2021



How do I sign up? To get started, [go here](#) and sign into your Google account. If you are already logged in, click on the grid of nine dots for Google apps at the upper right of the screen. Scroll to the very bottom and click "More from Google". Then scroll down until you see the Google Voice icon and click on it. Here are the icons to click on.



You now see the "dashboard" for your voice account, even though you don't yet have a number. To get your number, click the box at the bottom that prompts you to get a Google Voice number.



Type in the location where you want the phone number to be based, then choose your new number from a list of available ones. It can be either in your local area or elsewhere in the United States.

How does it work? Calls to your new number will forward to a number you specify. It might be your cell phone or landline. The number it forwards calls to is your linked number, and you can set up more than one number to ring at the same time. You can also edit the name for the number that will appear on

the recipient's caller ID.

One of the settings lets you see the number that the person dialed, as opposed to the number of the phone it is linked to. That lets you know that they are calling the Google Voice number. Adding that number with an identifying label to your Contact list shows you immediately the number the caller dialed. This allows you to answer the phone with a different greeting if you want.

You can also create a personalized message that people hear when they leave a voice mail. The default message, designed to eliminate spam and automated calls, asks the caller to speak their name so you get to decide whether or not you want to take the call.

When someone leaves a message at the new number, you can listen to it in your account dashboard, where a text version is also stored. You will also receive an email at your Gmail account when someone leaves a message.

There are dozens of settings you can adjust in the app or your computer dashboard. For example, you can limit the hours that phone calls to the number will ring (a "Do Not Disturb" setting). You can set up more than one phone to ring at the same time if you want. Be sure to have the other phone handy so you can enter the verification code that Voice will send you before it links the device to the number.

Blocking Unwanted Email

Sooner or later this happens to all of us. You continuously receive unwanted emails, (spam) from an individual or organization. Legitimate organizations usually have an Unsubscribe button within their message, which enables you to be dropped from their email list. If you attempt to unsubscribe from a less-than-legitimate mailer you are just confirming that your email address is good and even more spam will come your way.

Some individuals will not respect your request to stop sending (usually forwarding) you useless or offensive messages; more charitably they might lack the knowledge to be able to remove you from their mail distribution list.



Unwanted emails can be more than just bothersome or offensive. Some contain viruses that can render your system useless and destroy your data. Some people have had

to abandon email addresses when they received many dozens of unwanted emails every day.

Fortunately, all email programs have a feature that will allow you to block all emails from specific email addresses.

I'm going to describe the email blocking procedures for three popular web-based email programs: **Yahoo Mail, Outlook, and Gmail**. If you are using another email provider, the described procedures can be used to at least point you in the right direc-

tion.

Each of these programs allows you to use a list of blocked senders for individual senders whose messages you don't want to receive but can't easily stop.



Yahoo Mail can block all mail from up to 500 email addresses. All mail from these senders will be automatically deleted before you see it. To have Yahoo! Mail automatically delete all mail from a particular address:


- Left mouse click (hereafter I'll just say click if it's left) or just put your cursor on the settings gear in the upper right corner of the Yahoo Mail page.
- Click on "Mail Options" from the pull-down menu that has appeared.
- Click "Blocked Addresses" category under Advanced Options.
- Enter the unwanted email address under "Add an address:".
- Click on "+".

Your updated list of blocked senders will be saved automatically.

- Click on the gear that appears in the upper right corner of the Outlook mail window.
- Click on "More mail setting".
- Click on "Safe and blocked Senders".
- Click on "Blocked senders".
- Enter the unwanted email address in the "Blocked email address or domain" rectangle.
- Click on "Add to list>>"



Your updated list of blocked senders will be saved automatically.

- Click on the Settings gear that appears on the upper right corner of the Gmail window.
- Click on "Filters" near the top middle of the page.
- Click on "Create a new filter" at the bottom of the page.
- Enter the unwanted email address in the "From" rectangle.
- Click on "Create filter with this search>>".
- Click on "Delete it".



- Click on "Create Filter".

Conclusions and Recommendations


Never reply to or unsubscribe from spam; it just alerts the sender that it has a good email address. When you get a spam message, click on your program's "Spam" or "Send to Spam" or "Report as spam" to get rid of it and help your email provider learn to block messages from that server.

Even though email providers have active programs to help stop spam, it still comes. What winds up in your inbox is just a small fraction of the trash that is sent your way. Spammers are constantly changing techniques to defeat any filters.

You can work around the problem by creating and maintaining a "junk" or "throw down" email address that you know will be mostly spam. When I have to give out an email address to a website that I feel might be questionable, I provide the junk address and avoid possible spam in my "good" inboxes.

I have found it somewhat easy to write these reviews because I follow the following guidelines:


- Briefly describe the product or service

What the advantage of using solid-state drive in your computer?



The type of storage your computer uses matters for several reasons. Hard disk drives (HDD) and solidstate drives (SSDs) are the two main storage options to consider. The HDD is a data storage device that has spinning disks inside where data is stored magnetically.

The HDD has an arm with several read/write heads". It is similar to how a record player works. The record is like the hard disk and the needle arm is like the arm that moves across the surface of the disk to access pieces of data. SSDs have no moving parts. In an SSD, all data is stored in integrated circuits. This difference creates many advantages for



SSDs. Since there is no spinning disk, the SSD is made in various form factors and can be smaller than the HDD. Moreover, with no moving mechanical parts, they can be dramatically faster and more rugged. They require less power, generate less heat and have greater reliability.



These factors can lead to improved battery life in a laptop.

As you might expect, SSDs are quieter too. Without all those moving parts, SSDs are not affected by vibration or related thermal issues. When it comes to cost, the HDD has a slight advantage. However, the gap is closing as SSD prices begin to drop. A word of caution here. Both of these drives are available in a number of sizes and price levels. For example, WD

Reset Windows, Text Chats, and Disk Space Utility

Q. A pro tech friend tells me that reset is no longer needed because of the way Microsoft does updates. Why do you feel it is beneficial, given the downsides?

A. If there is one universal truth in technology, it is the idea that people often disagree. I prefer to believe that this is a feature, not a bug. Compared to the centuries that people have been building tools, personal technology tools are incredibly young. Tech changes faster than just about any other aspect of our lives. As a result, different people will have vastly different experiences.

There was an era in the PC's lifetime when it was routine advice to reset a computer about once a year. As PC designs improved, resets were needed less often. I agree that today's PCs are so refined that routine reset are overkill. That said, sometimes a PC is so broken only a full reset will bring it back to normal. As I have written previously, it is not for every PC owner or every situation, but it remains a useful troubleshooting technique.

I generally side with the advice that "if it Ain't broke, don't fix it." I hope this answer clears up any confusion I might have raised in earlier columns.

Q. Why does the recipient's name sometimes appear in red when I try to text chat on my Mac? Chatting with the same person works fine on my iPhone.

A. The Apple Messages app offers up the silent treatment when something goes wrong. Names highlighted in red in the address field mean that the message cannot be sent. There are a few reasons for this, usually involving typos. But there is also a problem when the person on the ' other end does not use an Apple product.

You should be able to switch the same chat session back and forth between your Mac and an iPhone. But it does not work if all you have is the other person's cell number. The iPhone can handle that simply fine. The Mac is a different story.

Most Macs cannot send text messages to phone numbers. There is a solution in the works, but it only works with the newest Macs.

Macs built in the last year fully support Apple's Continuity technology. Using Continuity, your Mac can use your iPhone to send text messages to telephone numbers. (For incoming telephone calls, it will also display the caller's name on your Mac's screen.)

Continuity' has been around for a few years, and some older Macs support it. But exploring all the possible combinations of hardware and software it works with goes

beyond the scope of this article. For more, see the link in Wander the Web 6eiow.

Q. How can I find the files on my computer that take up too much space?

A. What you are looking for is commonly called a disk space utility or disk space analyzer.

These apps scan your device's storage and present either a list or visual map to depict what is consuming your storage.

A caution first: Never remove a file unless you are clear on what it does. Otherwise, you could render an app unusable or lose treasured data. Most disk space apps have safety features to keep you out of trouble, but if you are not diligent you can still wreak havoc. Always back up your data first and be careful!

On Windows, I like TreeSize Free, from Jam Software. If you have a really big collection of files, it might be worth upgrading to the paid Personal Edition but try the free edition first.

On the Mac, check out Daisy Disk, from daisydiskapp.com or the Mac App Store. It is not free, but it works great. A free Mac app I also like is OmniDiskSweeper.com

I should also mention that both Windows and Mac have built-in scanners that will map your drive. To access it in Windows, open PC Settings > PC and Devices > Disk Space. On the Mac, choose About this Mac from the Apple menu, and click on the Storage tab. Then click on the Manage button.





Removing Apps, Trackers, Tags, and Google Photos New Fees

Q. There is an app on my phone that I do not use. Can I save space by removing it?

A. Not only will you save space, removing unneeded apps will make the phone much less cumbersome to use. When I set up my mom's new iPhone, I removed all but the half-dozen apps she used. That worked out great for her.

A word of caution: while you cannot damage a phone by deleting an unwanted app, you can lose data. Be sure the app is really never used before you remove it. If you delete an app by mistake, you should be able to re-install it, but data associated with the app will be lost.

To remove an app from Android, go to Settings, then select "Apps. The exact steps vary depending on the phone, but eventually you should be able to tap a disable button.

To remove an app from an iPhone, press the icon of the app until a menu appears. Select Remove App from the menu. I suggest choosing the option "Remove App From LaunchScreen." That way, it is less likely to lead to data loss.

While saving space is always useful, having a simple menu of apps makes the phone much friendlier to use.

Q. Are Apple's new AirTags and Samsung SmartTags ready for everyday use?

A. It is still early days for the technology. In demos they look great. They make it look easy to find your keys in a flash or see if you left your purse in a friend's car.

But there are also drawbacks that demos do not show. These kinds of devices use short distance Bluetooth radios, not GPS.

That means that in order to locate a tracker, another device with a stronger radio and GPS has to be in close range. The more devices in use that are compatible with the tracker, the better the odds the tracker will be located.

Apple has the biggest tracker network, with a billion devices circulating throughout the world.

But Apple has its drawbacks also, most noticeable at close range. If the tracker is somewhere in your house, the tracker will report that it is home, but not necessarily in the laundry basket downstairs. You can ask the tracker to emit a beep. And there is also a homing function that will help you point the phone towards the tracker (think of the kid's game Hot and Cold!), but that only works on the very newest iPhone models.

In general, Bluetooth trackers are young. There was a recent announcement from Amazon and Tile about teaming up to expand the Tile tracker network. And I doubt Samsung will be standing still. Today, Apple performs the best so far. I expect the technology will improve in the next few years, but right now, they are useful as long as you are aware of their limitations.

Q. I store my entire photo library on Google Photos. What do the recent policy changes mean to me?

A. Google Photos is no longer free starting sometime in June. If your current photo library is large enough, you should have received an email about the upcoming changes.

However, it is good practice to check for yourself. If your library requires more than 15 GB, you will need to create a Google One account and begin paying a monthly fee. The good news is that the fee for the first tier (100GB) is \$1.99 a month.

100GB should be enough to cover the storage needs of all but the very largest of libraries.

The 15GB free tier still exists, but it is like a free sample: enough to give you a taste, and perhaps hook you, but you have to pay to get the full value available. As I have written many times, I think that both Google Photos and iCloud Photo Library for Apple are inexpensive bargains.

They provide another backup to protect your photos, safe from fires, floods, and hurricanes.

Q. I am excited about Windows 11, but I do not want to wait until December to try it. Is there a way to get an advance copy?

A. It has been six long years since Microsoft launched Windows 10, and from what I have seen so far of Windows 11, it was time well spent.

Windows 11 is available now through the Windows Insider program (insider.windows.com). Once you enroll, navigate to Settings -> Update & Security -> Windows Insider Program on a Windows 10 device and enable the Dev Channel. From there, you can download the latest Windows 11 preview release.

My advice is to hold off a while unless you have a PC dedicated to testing. The usual caveats apply to pre-release versions of software. Expect bugs, potential data loss, and no real support.

Note also that the current preview release is missing one of the Windows 11 marquee features: the ability to run Android apps.

The system requirements are steep, so unless

your PC is fairly new, it might not be able to run the preview. Hopefully, the requirements will be relaxed closer to the "Holiday 2021" release date. Personal computing was once dominated by PCs, but the center of gravity is now tilted toward smart-phones and tablets. PCs are still important. But most people are better served by keeping their data in the cloud and accessing it from handheld devices. Windows 11 clearly reflects this new reality.

Q. I have enjoyed playing the piano all my life. Now that I am retired, I would love to teach music. Is there a way to find students online?

A. There are services that allow people to create online courses and make them available for sale, including Teachable, Udemy, and Skillshare, just to name a few. Typically, these services take a hefty percentage of sales in exchange for hosting the course. In addition to knowledge about the topic itself, you will need some basic skills in creating video and navigating a web site to set up a course.

These sites have the potential build a following, but with dozens of courses in every subject area competing for attention, building a course that can stand out among the crowd is difficult.

There is also a site dedicated to music "instruction called Lessonface. Unlike the services above, Lesson face connects teachers and students for live lessons over the Internet. This model is much closer to traditional fee-per hour tutoring, utilizing the Internet for video calls. Lessonface fees are far lower when a teacher finds a student directly, which is great for instructors who already have active students and want

the option to provide services online. While they are still a bit on the techie side of things to use, I think these services can be wonderful way for retirees to share their knowledge with others.

Q. If the Apple Watch can track someone's sleep, and it detects if someone falls, when does one charge it?

A. For several months now I have successfully worn my Apple Watch about 23 hours a day. I use it to track my exercise during the day, and my sleep at night.

I charge it in the morning as soon as I awaken. I put it on my nightstand charger while I get ready to start my day. I also charge it while reading before I go to sleep'.

According to Apple, and verified by my experience, the Apple Watch will recharge fully in about an hour. Because I charge the watch twice a day, it is usually fully charged in about 15 to 20 minutes.

Because of the fall detection feature and because the watch is waterproof, I am considering wearing it in the shower on days when I am alone.

In that case, I need to find a different routine. When I first switched from overnight charging to two charges per day, I experimented with different routines until I found one that fit my lifestyle. It might take a few weeks of trial and error, but the result is well worth the effort.

(Western Digital) uses names of colors to differentiate them. Blue, Green, Gold, Purple, Black and Red have different reliability levels. So, when you are making comparisons on a shopping site, as I found out, it can become quite difficult to compare apples to apples without close examination.

Even with shopping filters, it became hard for me to make a good comparison, especially when Sponsored, Ad-supported and Best Sellers would sneak into the list while not meeting any criteria I selected.

SSDs are more expensive than hard disk drives in terms of dollar per gigabyte. A 1TB internal 2.5-inch hard drive costs between \$40 and \$60, but as of this writing, the very cheapest SSDs of the same capacity and form factor start around \$100.

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
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
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
