If you're constantly searching for a good book, you might want to check out a new app called StoryGraph. It's a competitor to Amazon-owned Goodreads. https://www.thestorygraph.com

StoryGraph's slogan: Because life's too short for a book you're not in the mood for.

StoryGraph is available through the Mac App Store, for Windows PCs, through the App Store for Apple's Mobile devices, and via Google Play for Android devices. You can log into the website and use it instead of the app. Desktop App details for Mac and Windows

StoryGraph tracks your reading and helps you choose your next book based on your mood, favorite topics, and themes.

One of the neatest features is seeing how your reading changes over time and using the StoryGraph app or website to help you pick better books. StoryGraph will show you a graph revealing the number of books you've read, the number of pages, the "moods" of books, how fast you read the book, and other interesting facts.




















Definitions of the Month

CACHE

A cache is like a super-fast, short-term memory for your devices, whether it's your phone, computer, or even a web server. Imagine it as a kitchen pantry where you keep frequently used ingredients so you don't have to run to the grocery store every time you need them.

Here's how it works:

- When you access something for the first time, like a website or an app, your device downloads and stores a copy of it in the cache.
- The next time you access the same thing, your device checks the cache first. If it finds the copy, the copy loads up immediately, that's much faster than the device downloading it again from scratch.
- This saves you time and data, and it makes your device run more smoothly.

Here are some different types of caches:

Browser cache: This stores images, videos, and other website files, so your web pages load faster.

- **App cache:** This stores data and files for apps, so they can launch and run faster.
- CPU cache: This stores frequently used instructions and data for the processor, so it can access them quickly without having to go to main memory.
- DNS cache: This stores the location (IP address) of websites you've visited recently, so your device doesn't have to look it up every time.

Overall, caches are essential for making our devices faster and more efficient. They help us save time, data, and battery life, and they make for a smoother user experience.

Here are some additional things to keep in mind about caches:

- Caches are not permanent. They can get full, and old data may be deleted to make room for new data.
- Sometimes, the data in the cache may be outdated. If you're having trouble with a website or app, you may need to clear your cache to get the latest version of the data.
- Clearing your cache can also be a good way to free up space on your device.



Firefox Browser

During a Zoom meeting with one of my Milwaukee computer clubs and Senior Planet "Lunch and Learn" there was a discussion about Firefox web browser. I do not personally use Firefox as my main browser but I decided to give it a quick look to see what is new.

Firefox constantly receives updates with new features and improvements, so some of the new features might depend on which version you are using. Here are some noteworthy features recently added to Firefox:

Enhanced Privacy:

- Copy Link Without Site Tracking: This
 feature ensures that copied links no longer
 contain tracking information attached by
 websites. This is a handy tool for preventing
 your browsing activity from being monitored
 across different platforms.
- Global Privacy Control: This opt-in feature allows you to inform websites that you do not want your data shared or sold. It is enabled by default in private browsing mode and helps you take control of your online privacy.
- Enhanced Canvas Fingerprinting Protection: Firefox's private windows and ETP-Strict privacy configuration now include improved protection against canvas fingerprinting, a technique used to track users based on their unique browser configurations.
- Cookie Banner Blocker: This feature automatically blocks cookie banners and refuses cookies for supported websites in private browsing mode. It is currently being rolled

out for users in Germany and might become available in other regions soon.

URL Tracking Protection: This feature removes unnecessary tracking parameters from URLs, making it harder for websites to track your browsing activity across different platforms. It is enabled by default in private windows for all users in Germany and might be expanded to other regions later.

Improved Performance and Functionality:

- Hardware decoding support for AV1 video codec: This feature enables smoother playback of AV1 videos by utilizing your computer's graphics hardware. It requires the Microsoft AV1 Video Extension on Windows systems.
- Voice Control commands on macOS: Mac users can now control Firefox using voice commands, making browsing more convenient and hands-free.
- Wayland compositor on Linux: Firefox on Linux now defaults to the Wayland compositor when available, leading to improved touchpad and touchscreen gestures, swipeto-navigate functionality, better graphics performance, and more.
- Larger and clearer focus indicator: The focus indicator highlighting the currently active element in Firefox has been improved with increased size, contrast, and a white box-shadow for better visibility.

These are just some of the recent new features in Firefox. The browser is constantly evolving, so be sure to keep an eye out for future updates that might bring even more exciting improvements and privacy protections.





9to5Mac's Lauren Rosenberg began using StoryGraph after she was frustrated with the Goodreads App and its limited functionality:

As a devoted reader and someone who has been a member of the Goodreads community since 2013, I have found myself consistently frustrated with the app, especially in recent years, for everything that Goodreads doesn't do and doesn't offer. Aside from the fact that the app has barely updated since its inception making for an antiquated user experience some palpable misses



would help me better understand what kind of reader I am and, perhaps, what type of reader I want to be. It's within this space that The StoryGraph shines.

Rosenberg adds:

In addition to taking its user wants into the app's development, The StoryGraph also gives much-needed space to independent authors. Cofounder Rob Frelow: Suppose today you're interested in a dark murder mystery set deep in the woods featuring a kidnapping, and tomorrow you're in the mood for an emotional but funny romantic comedy set in a big city. In that case, you can find that on The StoryGraph.

You aren't stuck by your old ratings or past preferences. You won't see any 'promoted' books, which indie authors can typically never afford. You have complete control. She adds that StoryGraph allows you to:

- Rate, review, and track books
- "Buddy Read" with someone in your community
- Keep a reading journal
- Enter book giveaways
- Set goals by number of books, pages, or hours
- Browse book recommendations by mood, pace, type, or page number
- View personalized analytics




