



Westchester PCUG Members Give Presentations at the Greenburgh Public Library



The library staff asked WPCUG members to share their knowledge with their patrons and members recently gave a three-part series of talks at the library. The presentations were given to an audience made up of WPCUG members and interested parties who use the library's services.

Items needed to put on the sessions included tablecloths, the WPCUG banner, business cards for the presenters, club business cards, WPCUG brochures, sixpage sample newsletter, WPCUG upcoming event calendars, coupon for one

guest to attend a workshop, sign-in sheets for the library and WPCUG membership, feedback sheet, laptop with WPCUG.org, a general meeting flyer, and a follow-up letter.

Richie Nayman, President, covered a wide variety of topics in a session dubbed "Technology Today." The talk reviewed the history of evolving technology, how it affects the world and attendees personally. He then looked into what the future holds. Several of the audience delved into Hillary Clinton's server, and the techniques she used to delete 30,000 e-mails. Many had general questions about future technologies, which Richie handled well. As a result of Richie's talk, WPCUG gained five new members.

James Iscaro, All Things Apple Workshop Leader, provided an "All Things Apple" talk to a packed room—40+ attendees!—and Pierre Darmon, newly elected Board Member, gave a talk about "IBM's Watson," the *Jeopardy champ*.

Happy 40th Anniversary, ACGNJ!

The Early Years

"The first meeting of the ACSNJ was held on Friday night, June 13 at UCTI (Union County Technical Institute) in Scotch Plains NJ. There were 32 in attendance."

"These were the first words written in the very first ACSNJ Newsletter dated June 1975.

I hope you noticed something different in the quote and in my last sentence. I'm sure you are all wondering, "What is this ACSNJ? Is this a typo, Mike?" On the contrary, ACGNJ originally started out as the Amateur Computer Society of New Jersey. However, Steven P. Grey, who published a quarterly periodical known as the Amateur Computer Society (ACS) Newsletter from May 1966 into early 1975, sent a letter to Sol Libes stating that the ACSNJ infringed on his "organization." What is interesting to note is that the ACS never held any formal meetings. The December 1975 ACGNJ Newsletter (Issue no. 5) provided a distribution of where members resided – New Jersey (108), New York (19) and even Pennsylvania and California (one each). It's amazing to see that there were club members as far away as California! With no Internet as we know it today, I believe that these remote members most likely joined the club for the newsletter." Their founding president Sol Libes, is still active in the group as lifetime Director Emeritus. "Sol, along with Al Katz, also founded the Trenton Computer Festival in 1976. Sol, his wife, Lennie, and Al remain the heart and soul of TCF."

40 years ago the Intel 8080 microprocessor debuted and Bill Gates and Paul Allen wrote BASIC, and millions of people began to realize that they, too, could have their very own, personal computer. How technology has changed! At ACGNJ's May meeting, Brenda Bell, Secretary and Mobile Devices SIG leader, presented an overview of Mobile Wallets. Quoting from her abstract: "Mediums of commercial exchange have changed and evolved with civilization and technology. We have progressed from in-kind barter to precious substances, from gold coins to paper currency, to credit and debit cards, and cyber wallets. Now that we're migrating from desktops and notebooks to tablets and smartphones, the methods of buying and selling are adapting to match." Brenda discussed porting traditional payment methods to the mobile paradigm, including cyber wallets, mobile wallets, payment presentation methods, and issues and concerns which can affect the adoption of mobile payment technologies. She surveyed both major and minor players, covering Pros, Cons, and those areas that are just Not Ready For Prime Time. You will find Brenda's presentation at: http://n2kye.webwarren.com/ACGNJ/

NNCUG's newsletter reminds members to bring used ink cartridges to meetings for recycling. They recycle the cartridges and the money earned from the cartridges is used toward purchasing raffle prizes for the meetings. Prizes have included 16 GB Flash Drives with a case that holds six flash drives, a wireless mouse, noise isolation headphones, pop-up tablet and cookbook holder, Bluetooth speaker, and a Nuband Fitness Tracker valued at \$100. Raffle Tickets are \$2 for one and \$5 for three.

Their June meeting featured frequent speaker BJ McMillan discussing the ever-popular topic "What to do with Tablets/Smartphones-Besides Email, Photos, Books and Music." Meetings always include a question and answer session covering topics such as problem solving for individual problems with Windows 7 on older computers, dealing with annoying pop-ups, privacy issues created by using autofill for passwords and personal information. And there's always a stimulating/nourishing social hour at which to enjoy a cup of coffee and the pastry of the month.

BJ recommended APCUG's web site as a source for webinars and information on topics such as applications for Linux, cyber security, and net neutrality.

Potomac Area Technology and Computer Society (PATACS) www.patacs.org/

PATACS recently launched a membership drive by offering existing members six-months free membership for every new member recruited.

PATACS continues to benefit from being an Amazon shopping affiliate. Members and friends click (or



bookmark!) a simple link on the group's website to begin shopping. They then continue shopping on Amazon as usual, earning PATACS a 4 to 6.5% commission on purchases at no additional cost.

A recent meeting featured retired CIA CTO Bob Flores speaking on "Is Your Toaster an Insider Threat?", exploring the Internet of Things (IoT), also sometimes called the Internet of Everything (IoE). The talk explored

what we all should worry about and what to do to remain protected as the world becomes more and more connected.

Remembering the old (golden!) age of user groups, PATACS reissued the call for member presentations. I'm always on the prowl for potential speakers for PATACS and other groups; I enjoy making introductions which benefit speakers AND groups. If your speaker pipeline sometimes runs dry, remember the tried-and-true nudge for members:

Please consider speaking to your friends at a meeting. 

The June presentation featured Laurie O'Hall, an attorney with the O'Hall Law Firm telling attendees what happens to their online files when they die. This is a presentation every group should have.



Since 1994, one of the benefits of belonging to Melb PC has been the availability of the group's dial-up Internet service. The Melb PC in-house email system suffered considerable damage and disruption when being moved from rented facilities managed by AAPT in Burnley, near the Melbourne CBD, to the Group's premises in Warrigal Road Moorabbin. However the cash savings were considerable and the move was well overdue.

Internet service is now via broadband and the management of the day decided to use the Microsoft offering, free mail services through OUTLOOK.COM. The change was considerable but it worked. The service ran for only about 12 months when Microsoft changed its rules and the group was forced to adopt a change to Office365.

In July 2015 Office 365 is running smoothly and members have free access to Yammer, OneDrive and most other facilities included in the Office 365 Enterprise E1 package.

In the past month, 2334 messages have been posted in 12 Yammer Groups. The most popular Group is Chit Chat, which contains conversations of general interest to Melb PC members. These often contain discussions of current news events and whimsical surveys are held to enable members to contribute to polls of recent events. Technology News holds conversations of recent technology developments. Discussions of smart watches, SSD devices and many others have been featured in this group.

In order to halt the ever present membership decline Melb PC has designed and printed a tri-fold recruiting brochure that will be letter box dropped throughout the surrounding 5-mile radius during July 2015. Prospective new members are being offered three months free 'trial' membership.

As our members became more experienced we saw the usual expansion into other fields, with special interest in engineering, genealogy, programming etc. The club's main success has been its motto: To include and share with our new members at all meetings. At present the new interest is Linux and its usage.

GABE'S USER GROUP TIPS

The Joy of Newsletters -- Word, PDF, or Link?

I enjoy the diversity I see in reading a great number of user group newsletters. Some groups make these publications generally available via public links while others use newsletters as a members-only benefit. While I prefer and advise the former outlook, I'm sympathetic to the need to provide value for membership dues. But whichever approach is taken, I strongly feel that providing links -- rather than Word or PDF files -- is a more appealing distribution technology. This was emphasized by my recently receiving a 43 megabyte (!) newsletter file. I suggested to the editor that this was rather a big byte for people to receive and might not be tolerated by all ISPs. He responded that my note led to the Board reconsidering members-only-email-PDF and using a public link. I've always felt that benefits of easy online reading, referring back to past issue archives, potentially saving postage, and (especially) having newsletters findable by non-members as marketing material, outweigh any loss of members. I guess that some people might subscribe just for newsletters but I suspect that most people get much more from membership than that -- meetings, friendship, support/advice, other resources, access to APCUG benefits, etc.

Make It Simple, Make It Reliable, Keep It Valuable

Some of the best run user groups I visit use checklists for processes (general meeting open/close, Board agenda, budgeting and financial reporting, etc.). This isn't rocket science -- it's described in the wonderful book, "The Checklist Manifesto" by Atul G Wande, about how checklists save lives in

hospitals. While the stakes are much lower at user group meetings and in other activities, checklists can still avoid the "Dang, I forgot to mention next month's meeting..." moment when driving home.

Libraries help close the digital divide

Here's a great Washington Post article -- http://tinyurl.com/nparpgx -- on how valuable libraries are for folks on the wrong side of the legendary digital divide. Libraries are a great potential partner for user groups: a place to offer consulting and instruction, highlight community service, emphasize group identity and brand, and (hardly last/least) recruit new members. The same is true of other community organizations. For example, in the Washington, DC area, JCA SeniorTech -- http://www.accessjca.org/programs/technology-training/ -- offers classes throughout the region. So arranging mutual publicity between user groups and JCA benefits both.

"The Hidden Reference to the Beatles in Old Macs" http://nowiknow.com/let-it-beep/

If you used a Mac before it became super-popular to do so, you probably know a certain sound very well. The sound — a short burst, a mix between a bell and a steam train's whistle — would ring whenever you did something you weren't supposed to. Hit the delete key too many times, thereby deleting nothing? Beep. Click where you couldn't? Chirp. Or violate a seemingly innumerate other set of limitations of the operating system? Toot.

Creating User Group Histories

When was your group founded? By whom? How many original members are still active? What was in your group's first newsletter? When did Bill Gates speak there? If you can't answer those questions and there's no History link on your website -- recruit a history buff to gather nuggets such as oral Q&A about the early days, assemble a complete set of newsletter issues, merge meeting records from everyone who's been program chair, etc. Then schedule a historical retrospective for a meeting -- you may be surprised at the turnout, how many people are interested in group recollections and nostalgia. It's a great way to bring back and recognize people instrumental in organizing and guiding your group, it makes connections across generations of members and leaders, and it often motivates new people to volunteer.



USING VTC VIDEOS FOR TRAINING

Bob Sellards, President, Laguna Woods Village PC Club," Highly recommends using VTC videos for training to groups who are scratching around for either topics, teachers, or both. It is a great way to utilize the resources at hand while minimizing Instructor effort and time."

Here's an overview of how Bob put his three classes together -- Computers and Computing: A Potpourri of Useful Information. This 3-week course consists of video-taped lectures by experts (also Seniors) in their field or area of computing and computers.

• Six course descriptions were sent to club members as pre-enrollment PR. Twenty-one enrolled (capacity of classroom) and they were asked to select three they felt they would find most interesting and useful. Over ½ of the class responded. The three selected by the majority were

- "How Secure is My Device (Jere Minich); 10 Simple Things....(Judy Taylour); and File Folders, Networking and Cloud Storage (David Williams).
- Bob played each video in segments. At the conclusion of each segment he took student's
 questions; people always needed clarification or confirmation that what they heard/saw was
 what is necessary to do whatever. While each VTC video was just under an hour, this format
 allowed Bob to stretch each class meeting to just under two hours; the normal format for their
 classes.
- The students were, of course, encouraged to go home, fire up their PC or laptop and review/reinforce the week's material the normal MO for all the classes they present.
- This worked very well; in classes they referred to a handout Bob created it was a hybrid of what the original presenter had made with some alternations. He also used the handouts as collateral discussion material alongside the video.

He was assisted by two members on the floor with the students and could correct misunderstandings or "operator errors" as they proceeded (again, their standard MO).

This was a groundbreaking event for LWPCC and was very well received. Bob expected no less, and it was helpful to get the confirmation at the end of Week 3 when students completed a short feedback sheet. The primary "complaint" was that there was only three meetings . . . the majority said they should add at least 1 or 2 more weeks when they offer it again in the fall term.


THE 22nd SOUTHWEST TECHNOLOGY & COMPUTER CONFERENCE IS HISTORY
